The income is derived from the interest of the endowment fund and the subscriptions. The fall in the rate of interest has decreased the former and the subscriptions of 1893 fell off \$1,225.

The remains of William Trent of Maple Creek and formerly of Moose Jaw, passed through Toronto on Tuesday on route to Newmarket for interment. Deceased, in company with his brother Arthur, was engaged in ranching some 35 miles from Maple Creek. About four weeks ago he visited Moose Jaw and took west a herd of cattle. On the way up, while handling a horse, he suffered a severe strain which, while not at the time causing alarm, has ultimately ended his life.

Small-pox has broken out at several points in Ontario and vaccination of those who have not had it performed on them should be attended to at once. Diphtheria also is epidemic in Detroit, eleven schools being closed by order of the Board of Health. MACCABEES.—Considerable buzz has been caused in our Stouffville Tent of Maccabees during the past week or two due to the fact that Deputy popular and well known Deputy Supreme Commanders, Messrs. R. P. Coulson and D. McNair who have been starring Northern Ontario in the interests of the K. O. T. M. The matter of arresting vagrants at East Toronto by a county constable was the subject of considerable discussion at the recent session of the County Council. The fee for making such arrests is \$1 each and the locality is exceptionally fine as many vagrants make their exit from the trains at this point. It is said that over 150 arrests were made during three months and locked up in the county jail and kept there at the public expense. The tramp nuisance is one which is increasing in magnitude and some other method than dishing them out at the public board, be the porridge ever so thin, should soon be adopted. The county council passed a resolution to memorialize the Government to amend the law as affecting the case.
