RE VANDERMAN.—The celebrated case of the Vaughan road has recently been disposed of by the Supreme Court. The court of action arose out of the fact that the company controlling the road refused to make the necessary repairs notwithstanding it had been duly notified by the township engineer to do so. The travelling public were informed by posters that the collection of tolls on said road were illegal and consequently payment was refused. The matter, however, was finally brought to the notice of the court where after much legal quibbling and twisting it found its way to the Supreme Court. On the 13th Dec. judgment was given with the result that the injunction restraining the Vaughan Road company from collecting tolls, until they are authorized to do so, is granted. The collection of tolls is discontinued, but if the company is available and willing to pay the costs of the company's property is to be mortgaged for \$900. The company have the right to appeal to the Privy Council, but it is thought they will continue proceedings in this matter.

The Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, has just issued a bulletin on cherry culture, the work of John Craig, horticulturist, in this city, and it is stated that his experience has determined that crown grafting of cherries shows a gain of over fifty per cent. over budding. Stocks in fruit in spring of one year's growth, are in spring of year the tree is taken up and transplanted. The plants are now placed a little deeper than before so that the earth can be brought up above the point of union and thus induce roots to be emitted from the graft. In the case of budding a much firmer joint is made by applying the wax before wrapping on the bands.
