OPPOSITION TO POLL TAX

Quite a lot of opposition to the Poll Tax is taking place in Uxbridge Township at the present time according to the Uxbridge Journal. Some ratepayers are going so far as to declare the Bylaw was put through by one of the Councillors. This is not so, as any motion or bylaw of this nature must be carried by a majority of the council. This particular Act was accented to by all the council, and is an Act in lieu of the former system under pathmasters, when every male over the age of twenty-one years and under sixty was liable for road work or pay a certain sum. This Act has always been in force and with the passing of the Pathmasters, came into force in the Township. Part of the Act reads as follows, certain individuals being exempt:

Every person liable to pay poll tax shall pay the same to the Collector appointed to collect the same within two days after demand therefor by the Collector; and in case of neglect or refusal to pay the same the Collector may levy the same by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the defaulter, with costs of distress; and if no sufficient distress can be found the defaulter, for his refusal or neglect to pay the said sum, shall incur a penalty of \$5.00.

Where any male inhabitant has been employed by the same person for not less than thirty days such employer shall pay over to the Collector on demand out of any wages due to such employee the amount of such tax and such payment shall relieve the employer from any liability to the employee for the amount so paid.

REEVE'S SALARY \$3.00!

With few exceptions councillors and Reeves are paid for their services at council meetings in York County. Authority for this is found in the statutes passed when Hon. E. C. Drury was premier of Ontario, and for the most part has been taken advantage of all over the country. Here in Stouffville we have had economical bodies still carrying on gratis. Although the reeve this year has spent days working in the interest of the town, he hasn't pulled down any salary and the "pickings" amount to the magnificent sum of \$3 which was paid him at the meeting on Friday for his work in selecting jurors. The statutes provide that the reeve, clerk and assessor shall attend and be paid. So long as the reeve of Stouff-

YORK COUNTY COUNCIL

That big spending body, the York County Council, met in their annual fall session last week in Toronto, on Tuesday morning. Adjournment was made again on Friday with very little completed business, and although some of the members favored meeting on Monday, better judgment prevailed and the members decided to remain at home until Tuesday, thus saving the county some \$500 in cash which it would have cost to assemble for the extra day.

The Veteran's Association of North York appeared before the council soliciting a grant of \$1500 to relieve distress cases. Last year the county gave \$2500, and Capt. Wallace told how this was spent. Reeve Baker of Whitechurch, Moore of Scarborough, Warden Graham and Deputy-Reeve Westbury all spoke in support of the grant. York Township has a great many veterans and when the Deputy-Reeve spoke so strongly in favor of the grant the warden did him one better and suggested that a sum be set aside each year for this work. Warden Graham wasn't to be outdone by even an ex-soldier like Westbury, so that on this score the soldier vote in York should be divided up. The grant will probably be made this week, and some of the members wanted to set aside a fund, but that is not likely to pass this session.

The Education Committee met Premier Ferguson last week and asked for special legislation that would give the county some voice in the expenditure of some for new high schools. Down in the south of the county they have been installing expensive restaurants, skating rinks, gymnasiums, and almost anything else they could put through at tremendous cost, and the county is called upon to pay 50 per cent of the cost. The Premier saw the view point of county legislators and promised action, after the request is put to him in concrete form.

ORANGEMEN MUST NOT SELL LIQUOR

On Sunday morning of last week the members of United Lodge of Auroa, attended Divine worship in Wesley United Church, Vandorf, in full regalia. Rev. Thos. R. White, Past Grand Master of the Grand Black Chapter of Ontario West, and pastor of the church, preached the sermon and the choir rendered two very choice anthems. In the course of his address, Mr. White emphasized attendance upon church worship and proper observance of the Sabbath as something for which all Orangemen stand, stating that many men who had indifferently fallen out of the habit of worship were brought back by the Orange Association. He commended the Holy Name Society of the Roman Catholic Church, but stated that every Orangeman belongs to a society that discourages the taking of the name of God in vain among themselves and others. On the Temperance question the Orange Association remains firm. The Constitution does not permit anyone to become a member who engages in the manufacture or sale of intoxicating drinks for beverage purposes, or if after becoming a member he engages in the sale of intoxicants he will be expelled from the Order. During the past year the Grand Master and Sovereign of British America, Dr. J. W. Edwards, M.P., was asked to give a ruling on the question of whether members of the Orange Order could be employed as managers or clerks or salesmen in Government Commission Liquor Stores in any of the Provinces having "Government Control" and the ruling of the Grand Master was that no member of the Orange Order could be so employed, and he was upheld by the Committee on Constitution and Laws of the Grand Lodge of British America and by the unanimous resolution of the Grand Orange Lodge of British America, which has jurisdiction in all the Provinces of Canada and Newfoundland.
