### THE HEALTH OF MARKHAM

The annual report of Dr. C. R. McKay, medical officer of health for the Township of Markham, has just been filed with the municipal council of that Township for the year 1927.

The population of the Township as shown by the last revised assessment roll is 5323, and the number of deaths for the year totalled 48, or a decrease from last year of seven. This short saving of life didn't help the population very much for last year the stork was responsible for 99 living births while this year the number dropped to seventy.

In respect to communicable diseases the doctor's report stated, "beyond the odd case of mumps and chicken pox the Township is free from infectious diseases, and with smallpox in our neighboring municipalities we have reason to be thankful we have so far escaped. Many parents are taking the wise step and having their children vaccinated. In all cases where infectious diseases existed strict quarantine regulations and isolation was carried out. The Schlick test for diphtheria was made in one of our schools and 90 per cent of the children have a positive response and were given a toxoid protection.

Infectious diseases—The number of infectious diseases reported for 1927 are:—Chicken pox 10 cases; diphtheria 3, death; German measles 40; measles 20; mumps 6; scarlet fever 4; tuberculosis 9; whooping cough 6; typhoid fever 1; gonorrhoea 2.

Schools—Twenty-one schools were inspected. There are 3 schools in which the sanitary conveniences were defective. Water supply good in all but 2. Total school attendance 793 or 15 per cent of population.

One complaint was received, re Stanley Boynton's slaughter house. This was inspected and ordered to be cleaned up.

Markham Township Council held a record business session last week, cleaning up all matters and accounts in readiness for the final meeting on the 15th.

The council granted \$10 to the North York Christmas Market for prizes and \$35 to the Unionville Public Library.

C. E. Watson of Stouffville wrote that he had been assessed for \$400 income which he claimed was illegal and asked to be reimbursed for same.

The Department of Highways wrote that the highway accounts were well kept and correct as reported by the auditors, and that the amount due and paid township out of provincial funds for 1926 was \$34,545.54.

Wilfred Degeer of Box Grove wrote that he had forewarned the council in regard to the amount claimed by him for last damages and that he now intended to put it in other hands for collection. The clerk was instructed to write Mr. Degeer that he could be heard next meeting.

Dr. C. McKay of Unionville, township hall, Unionville, Friday, Dec. 23, \$265.55, as his account for the year and the same was paid. Last year the doctor's account totalled \$331.
