In December's Rear View Mirror column Maurice Smith wrote, "(Musselman Lake) is still known as that despite locals having recently had the name on the signposts changed to Musselman's." However, my family has owned property at the lake since 1923 and it has . to as Musselman's Lake in many more instances always been called Musselman's Lake by the residents. Cedar Beach Park has always been on Musselman's Lake. It was not until recently that a few newer people to the area started to refer to the lake as Musselman.

Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville documents all say Musselman's, the Department of Transportation refers to the lake as Musselman's, and all reports from the Lake Simcoe Region Conservation Authority refer to the lake as

Musselman's. Although the Google Map headline uses Musselman, all other references on the site are to Musselman's. The Wikipedia entry also has its heading as Musselman, but again, the body of the article consistently refers to the lake as Musselman's.
