Volunteers Raise Funds For Tanzanian Solar Project

When Musselman's Lake resident Sherri Ireland visited an orphanage in Tanzania last year with a group of volunteers, it was a life-altering experience.

"It started off with a friend I play golf with, who mentioned she was thinking about going to Africa," said Sherri. "She lives in Collingwood and is friends with someone up there whose sister runs an orphanage."

As her friend told her more about the Majengo Children's Home and asked if she would be interested in joining her on the trip, "I said 'count me in'." The home provides food, medical assistance, housing, education, sports and recreation to its 84 young residents, in a warm and

loving environment.

The volunteer group who accompanied her included Denise Heapey from Claremont and Lisa Oelke from Toronto, who is in the solar industry. Lisa was asked for her advice on a solar solution for the orphanage as it is not on the electrical grid. She quickly enrolled three volunteers - two engineers and an electrician - to come up with a design.

"By May 2014 the design was complete but the price tag was daunting at \$40,000 US," said Sherri. "The solar funds had to be raised without impacting the operational cost fundraising." Sherri, Lisa and Denise responded to the challenge by raising the entire amount by last December.

With the assistance of a local company in Tanzania, they are planning to return this spring to complete their mission, said Sherri.

"We're continuing to fundraise for the solar (system) because it needs to be maintained to work properly. And once we were over there, we couldn't just leave (the children) behind, but we couldn't bring them with us, so we had to decide what we could do."

The team's efforts have already made a huge difference, as a note on the Majengo website attests.




Hospital Fundraiser Marks 25 Years
