The Latcham Gallery is thrilled to present Hybrid Vigour, a solo exhibition by Markham-based artist Xiaojing Yan.

Elegantly weaving together works in paper, bronze, video and pearls that explore her Chinese/Canadian hybrid cultural identity, Yan creates art that is smart, personal and poetic. Cloud Cell (2014) is a breathtaking example of her sculptural art.

It is made from 13,000 freshwater pearls strung along multiple threads of monofilament that create a rendering in three dimensions - a floating apparition - and resembles both a traditional scholar's stone and a menacing mushroom cloud.


Other works in the exhibition also carry layers of meaning that leave us contemplating the reality that change is the only constant element of human existence. By juxtaposing the solidity of tradition, family and history alongside the fluid, tenuousness of the experience of immigration, Yan explores a duality that is greater than the sum of its parts.

With nods to both east and west, her works uncover an experience that is common wherever there are populations on the move seeking a life transformed. This exhibition is not to be missed.

Xiaojing Yan will give a talk at the gallery on Wednesday, June 17 at 7 p.m. Admission is by a suggested donation of \$5. Hybrid Vigour is on view until July 4.
