

FORMER MAYOR HITS CAMPAIGN TRAIL

Wayne Emmerson, who served three terms as mayor of Whitchurch-Stouffville before quitting in 2003, has announced his candidacy for the post in the upcoming election.

Mr. Emmerson, who underwent hip replacement surgery a year ago, said that health had been a major factor in his decision to leave local politics, but that he was now fit and ready to take on a new challenge. "I just want to get back and help the community like we did in the nine years we were there," said the Ballantrae resident, who also served two terms on council.

"The main thing is to get the council back working together. We need strong leadership. I want to get back to the region so our voice is heard again. It's really good to work with regional council because they are our big brothers." He also supports the idea of a community theatre.

"I would like to bring another option to council for a proper theatre; a brand new facility, along with a seniors' centre. I have a plan I would like to put in place." He wants to see a reduction in the number of stoplights on Main Street. "We need to straighten some of those roads, sooner rather than later," he noted.

He is a strong proponent of preserving Memorial Park. "It's a huge asset, given to us years and years ago. We should preserve and maintain it, and make it a centrepiece of our community."

The downtown core can survive and grow if merchants and residents pull together to sup-

port it, said Mr. Emmerson. He thinks the bypass will make a significant difference to traffic in town. "The bypass should have been in by now; we need to get that done." He is a firm believer in regional fire and dispatch, and wants to see one fire department for all of York Region.

"I think it's time to clean up Musselman's Lake and put money behind this. We need to control our planning and put more money into roads and sidewalks, but we also need keep operating costs down. The budget is a big process; we must make sure we get the biggest bang for our buck."

Emmerson's new motto is, Whitchurch-Stouffville, I am listening. "We've got a great team behind us, and my family is very supportive. The team is ready to go."



Taking care of business

First time mayoral candidate Don Barker is a retired businessman who has lived in Stouffville for almost 30 years.

His biggest concerns include taxation levels, rapid growth without adequate infrastructure, and recycling. He thinks municipal taxes are too high, and wants an in-depth review of government revenue and expenditure. "My mother lives in Agincourt and has a house very similar to mine. She pays within five to 10 bucks the same as me, but I don't get nearly the services she gets."

He also plans to address the quality and quantity of town water and the state of the sewage system. "This includes looking into the problem of the big pipe heading through Markham into Toronto. Someone didn't think far enough down the road. They should have expected problems and I'm worried about developers suing the civic government for being irresponsible," he said.


"A lot of roads around the town are in dire need of repairs and it's been that way for years. I'm going to look into why previous councils approved such a massive program of new housing. We were labelled as slow growth by the province; I want to find out why the council strayed from that."

He believes the town needs to do more for young people. "One constant message (from youth) is that Stouffville is the most boring place you can live," he said. "That problem has to be solved."

Building code administration and bylaws that forbid overnight parking are other areas he wants to address. He also wants to establish a full green box recycling program for the community. Mr. Barker is unequivocal about the future of Memorial park. "It needs enhancements, but it's a landmark and it has to stay."

A businessman for 32 years, he worked for Bell Canada and also ran his own high technology business. "I know all about taking care of business," he said.


Mayor Sherban sets sights on second term

recycling programs. "I have always believed in open communication with the citizens of Whitchurch-Stouffville, and I will continue to be an open door mayor who listens to the community," she noted. "I said in my first campaign for mayor that I would focus on creating a stronger, more dynamic and forward-looking Whitchurch-Stouffville, and those goals are more important to me now

than ever." She is proud of the community she serves, said Mrs. Sherban, and she wants all residents, old and new, to share that pride.
