There'll be no gruelling walks down a long, intimidating runway under the searing spotlights, with the candidates wearing those outlandish outfits and ultra funky hair in a myriad of colours, as stern faced judges search for any hint of a flaw in their presentation.

Instead, the candidates will take a casual stroll in the midst of those in attendance, including family, friends and whoever else wants to come. Yes, there will be four judges, including the editor of the Stouffville Free Press, Kate Gilderdale, who, once she got over the disappointment of being told she was just a few (light\*) years beyond the cutoff age for candidates, has promised to go about her duties with the same gusto she brought with her when she helped judge the Legion's speech competition a few years back.
