## Helping others a way of life for Don Acton

"Only when you drink from the river of silence, shall you indeed sing. And when you have reached the mountain top, you shall begin to climb."

These words were spoken by Wanda Stride, pastor of Lemonville United Church, during a service of celebration for Donald B. Acton on June 30 at the O'Neill Funeral Home. Mr. Acton went to be with his Lord June 26, at Sunnybrook Veterans Hospital, Toronto. He was 84.

"But more importantly," she said, "you will remember how you were touched by Don, and that will be his legacy; that will be our greatest comfort – that everyone is part of this intricately woven network."

Besides his wife, the former Marian Eleanor Thompson of Aurora and now of Stouffville, are two sons, David and Bill, Toronto; a daughter, Brenda Storr, Victoria, British Columbia; one sister, Evelyn MacDonald of Montreal and one brother, Robert of London. Mr. Acton was predeceased by a sister, Eileen Sweet. He also leaves six grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

## Skilled quilter raised thousands for Third World missions

She was a quilt-maker without equal.

For Melba Steckley, in later years, this was her life. She went to be with her Lord June 18. Had she lived another month, she would have been 102.

Melba's quilt-making skills came to the fore when

one of her creations sold for \$5,000 at an auction hosted by the Mennonite Central Committee at Black Creek Pioneer Village. Two others brought in \$4,000 and \$2,000 respectively. She donated all proceeds to Third World missions. In addition, Melba's quilts continually won red and blue ribbons at Markham Fair.

Born at Clarence Centre, New York, the former Melba Martin grew up on the family farm near Buffalo. In her teen years, she attended Messiah College in Pennsylvania. It was here she met and developed a close friendship with the late Mabel (Cober) Steckley of Gormley.

When Mabel Cober and Levi Steckley were married, Melba served as Mabel's maid-of-honour. Later, when Mabel died in a tragic car crash, Melba and Levi were wed. The year was 1962.

Through this union, Melba inherited six children, Bruce, Alma, Margaret, Reatha, Carole and Mary. She loved them as if they were her own and they, in turn,

It was during Melba's early working years she gained the respect of well-to-do residents, serving as a house-keeper and nanny in several upscale homes.

One such employer honoured her dedication by taking her, with his family, to Nassau every winter. He also presented her with a new Buick every year, so much did he appreciate her help.

Melba drove one of these cars across the United States to California. She retained her driver's license until age 93. Following her husband's passing, Melba moved to Parkview Apartments and later Parkview Home.

In July, 2004, Melba marked her 100th birthday with a gathering of friends and relatives at Heise Hill Brethren in Christ Church. Many extended family members attended including several from the United States and overseas.

At a service of celebration June 22, also at Heise Hill, Melba was described as "an elegant lady with a twinkle in her eye and a gentle sense of humour". Rev. Harvey Sider of Stouffville delivered the message. Personal tributes were paid by Lester Martin, Mary Green and Alma McTaggart.

Heise Hill pastor Paul Penelton offered the opening prayer and a reading from Scripture. Interment was made in the adjoining cemetery. Pall-bearers were Joe, John and Kate Steckley; Donald and John McFadden and Lester Martin
