YDHR rides into fall colours

From the deep reds of the sumac bushes to the yellows and oranges of the maples and oaks, fall on the Oak Ridges Moraine is a riot of colour.

Mother Nature determines the exact timing, but a ride on the York-Durham Heritage Railway in October will reveal the best colours that the region has to offer. In preparation for winter, wildlife is often bolder at this time of year, and more than the usual number of sightings of beaver, deer, turkeys and foxes can be had from the train.

from leave Trains Uxbridge station at 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. and from Stouffville GO station at 1 p.m. on Oct. 7, 8, 15, 21 and 22. The train consists of vintage railway cars, some dating back over 85 years, hauled by 50-yearold "first generation" diesel locomotives. On board, passengers will find an open door baggage car with safety barriers for enhanced viewing of the fall colours, as well as souvenir and snack counters.

Round trip fares are \$18 for adults and \$12 for children aged two to 12, with

a \$15 fare for seniors (65+) and students from 13 to 17. Children under two and seniors 90 and over travel free. Group discounts are available, along with family passes at \$50 for two adults and up to three children. Caboose rides, at an additional \$10 per passenger, and one way trips are also available.

This season's special events include a Halloween trip, which takes place Oct. 27 from Uxbridge and Oct. 28 from Stouffville, and our Ride with Santa in November

and December from Uxbridge, Stouffville and Unionville. Thinking of a family birthday party? Contact us in advance and we can arrange a block of seats for your party. The birthday girl or boy always travels free.
