Whitchurch-Stouffville is growing like a weed, a fact attested to by the large number of contenders for the 2014 election. Five would-be mayors and 23 would-be councillors have bravely put their names forward as candidates for public office, and by the looks of things it's going to be quite

a ride. The urban core of Country Close to the City has morphed into a major suburban hub. with all the pros and cons that come with the territory. Among the positives are a more diverse population, bringing a wider variety of experiences from the cultural to the culinary.

The current council has established new walking trails, soccer fields, neighbourhood parks, bicycle paths and a skateboard park. It has drawn up plans for a major upgrade to the leisure centre which would include a long-overdue expansion of the library. We also have a second arena and SoccerCity. a year-round facility for a variety of sporting activities and a venue for indoor walkers and special events.

Yes, folks, it's time for another voting hazards for walkers and cyclists in residential neighbourhoods. The new, wider intersection at Ninth Line at Main St. may improve traffic flow, but will be less pedestrian-friendly, especially if it is equipped with traffic signals that don't automatically allow people to cross on a green light, but require them to push a button and wait for a walk signal.

In effect, the new traffic signals have taken the right of way from pedestrians and given it to vehicles, a feature which may make sense on highways, but not in urban residential areas with higher foot traffic. There are also valid concerns about pedestrian safety at Mostar and Hoover Park Drive, where students can be seen trying to cross the four lane road to reach Oscar Peterson. And is it too much to hope that the new council will finally ensure that crossing Main Street is not a threat to life and limb by adding at least one crosswalk or set of traffic signals between Ninth Line and Mill Street?
