We will remember

Remembrance Day is just around the corner and those who can should go to the special service presented by the Stouffville Legion Branch 459. The date is Nov. 11 at 11 a.m. at the Legion on Ninth Line.

Veterans will bow their heads in memory of their lost comrades as residents join them in honouring the thousands who gave their lives for the freedoms we embrace today. The closest most of us get to war is reading newspapers or watching the grisly bombings happening all over the world on TV.

Closer to home we see Canadian soldiers returning in caskets carried by their fellow soldiers, all of them the victims of war. Parents and loved ones watch as the bodies are taken to the waiting hearse. Another life lost, another future ended.

Young wives grieve and children too young to understand watch as the camera bulbs flash and their mothers cry. War is ugly and the pain it causes changes lives forever. Those fortunate enough to escape carry a scar deep within that no doctor can heal. Time can only dull the pain. Unbearable memories become a part of their lives which they will carry to their graves.

My Uncle Guy lives in the veterans' facility in London, Ontario. Now in his eighties, he is lost to reality and lives in a place that leaves him isolated and alone except for his memories of another time. Serving in the Canadian Army as a career soldier

he used to tell stories about the battles he had fought and the number of friends he had lost. As he got older, the stories became more frequent and his eyes more distant as he told of lying in a field in the middle of the night with the dead scattered around

He would wait until silence filled the air before eventually crawling, slowly and quietly, filled with fear, out of harm's way. When my aunt passed away he became more obsessed with memories from the many years he had served and the horrors he had witnessed.

Looking out the window he will tell you of the enemies lying in wait until darkness falls. He will stare into a distance filled with thoughts and images that time cannot erase. The memories haunt his remaining days. Residents who share the floor live in the same world as my uncle, with their last days or years surrendered to an enemy who might not have taken their lives physically, but who left marks deep within emotionally.

I think of him spending his days lost to a war over so very long ago. I think of the Canadian soldiers who must share the same fear that is invisible to the eye but is there nevertheless. Our soldiers, our heroes, live these nightmares, over and over again, daily and forever after.

We will remember.
