Fight for a Cure

Although Terry Fox died in 1981, his legacy still lives on 25 years later. To date, over \$400 million has been raised worldwide. The run is held in more that 50 countries every year. Last year, over 3 million students at 9000 schools participated in the Terry Fox Run.

On Friday, September 29th 2006, SDSS held its 2 nd annual Terry Fox

Run for Cancer Research. A variety of students in different grades and with different activity levels all got together to support Terry Fox's dream. Whether they ran, jogged or walked, they all had one thing in common; the hope for a cancer-free future.

Last year our school raised over \$1200. In this year's 5km run with many students away for sports events or class trips, there were 130-140 students who got involved and raised over \$1550 in donations. After the run, participants received a free barbecue lunch, free drinks and freezies, and free deodorant courtesy of the school administration and the Athletic Council. Students also received Terry Fox temporary tattoos and bookmarks. Learning for a Sustainable Future

Teri Burgess is one of the newest editions to the SDSS staff. Teri was a former math and science teacher with the York Region District School Board and was sent to Stouffville to work on the latest program which focuses on environmental and health initiatives. Learning for a Sustainable Future, or LSF, is one of the programs designed to make this happen. LSF is a non-profit national group and is working with the school board to help make SDSS a more sustainable school. SDSS was chosen for this program to be the model school to show how the plan is working and will hopefully result in the sustainability of schools across the country. LSF involves being sustainable in three major areas: social, economical, and environmental. The program is designed to be safe and healthy for humans, animals, plants, and the environment, in our current time and in the future; and from our community to the ocean. LSF is also integrating with another program called Education for Sustainable Development (ESD). This program is focused on educating people on how to make decisions that ensure our environment will be safe. ESD will use strategies like teaching the skills people can take with them, focusing on things that are close to them and seem more urgent; using a hands-on attitude. These programs are not here to tell people what to do, but are designed to teach the knowledge and the skills for making sustainable decisions.

Teri is working at the school to be a consultant who can help and inform staff and students of these initiatives. She will be working with Ms. Onisto on these two projects for a number of years. As the new SDSS building is being made, the LSF group will be making sure the building design conforms to the sustainable school guidelines. Things like, having carpeting made without toxins and synthetics; keeping a stricter recycling program; and buying gym uniforms made locally and naturally are some of the changes that will be implemented. To confirm that this plan is working properly surveys and regular school check-ups will be carried out.

The idea of a sustainable school is to create a healthier environment for the community. As a model school, SDSS will allow visitors to come in and tour the school to how the LSF program is working. We hope this will encourage more schools to become sustainable and look forward to our new and sustainable school.
