- A Balancing Act -HIGH SCHOOL AND HOCKEY

When it comes to planning his future, Stouffville Spirit star Simon Gysbers has tried to keep as many doors open as possible. And that has led to a delicate balancing act.

For the past three years Gysbers has tried to maximize his hockey skills playing for the Spirit in the Ontario Provincial Junior 'A' Hockey League while also completing his high school education.

By all accounts the hard work has paid off. Next fall the 18-year-old from Oak Ridges will attend Lake Superior State University in Sault Ste Marie, Mich. on a scholarship. And on Nov. 22 Gysbers learned he had been named to the National Hockey League draft list, and that he was one of 40 players selected the inaugural Canadian Junior A Hockey League Prospects game, which will be played in Yorkton, Sask. on Dec. 7.

He attributes much of his success on and off the ice to hard work and discipline.

"I had a concrete schedule, and that kept me going," said Gysbers, who graduated from Cardinal Carter High School in Aurora. "I was constantly working, but I stuck to it. I learned a lot of discipline, and that's going to help me [in university] next year."

According to Spirit genmanager Ken Burrows, there are 15 players on the current

team roster that are currently also attending high school. The league is open to players between the ages of 16-20.

For almost all of them, Burrows said, the goal is a scholarship to a U.S. school.

"It's very hard," he acknowledged. "They're at the rink five or six times a week."

One of those players is 18-year-old Brock Ouellet, who is taking Grade 12 classes in Stouffville.

"I've gotten accustomed to the balance [between hockey and school]," said Ouellet, a Lindsay native who is in his third year in the league. "Maybe in my first year it was a bit of a challenge, but I'm getting used to handling both."

Ouellet said he gets strong support from the Stouffville coaching staff, and the team has a tutor available for any players who require some extra assistance. Although he is currently only taking two courses, he said his school

and hockey schedules keep him busy, and out of trouble.

For Gysbers, the balancing act became particularly tough around exam time and the league playoffs. On those occasions, he received support from a predictable source.

"My Mom would calm me down a lot," he said. "She always had some words of wisdom for me. She'd just do those things that moms do."

Although Gysbers has already finished high school and doesn't go to university until next fall, he hasn't slowed down. He is currently taking an English course by correspondence through Seneca College and will also take a psychology course next semester.

"That will give me a bit of an edge when I go away next year," said Gysbers, who is eyeing a career in business or marketing. But, he added, "I want to take hockey as far as I can. I want to keep my options open."
