

At Your Gallery

Pickled sculpture, paper linens, a giant sod-covered hare and lush, vividly flocked drypoint prints await visitors to The Latcham Gallery's exhibition *Fruits of Labour*.

Liz Parkinson and Mary Catherine Newcomb share a fascination/obsession with the diversity of the natural world and the attention they afford their subject pays off in spades in the works on exhibit at the gallery until Dec. 23.

Mary Catherine Newcomb's *Product of Eden* 2007 is a series of small figurative sculptures of "saints" that started on the vine as eggplant, zucchini and other squash. Shortly after the plant dropped its flower and started forming fruit, Newcomb intervened with a tiny crown and a mould of the figure into which the vegetable grew. In 2007 she had a bumper crop of these organic sculptures and many of the fruits of this labour now live out their lives in an array of glass jars, pickled and displayed in a manner that evokes the impression of a mad scientist at work.

Liz Parkinson is interested in the

classification and display of the natural world and the language used to describe it. She also engages with the different narratives that are generated based on the kind of "collecting" being done, and often turns those narratives on their heads.

In her series *Heirloom* as well as *Morphology* she has taken as her subject historically recognized garden plants that are now seen as weeds and/or invasive species. Mixing various traditional printmaking techniques with contemporary practices, she illuminates and layers these narratives and assembles them onto luscious and poignant bedspreads and blankets as well as large scale intaglio prints. Check out this spectacular exhibition before Dec. 23.

Watch out for *Images 2015*, coming up in the new year. This exhibition is always a winner with our audience as it showcases work from the graduating class at Stouffville District Secondary School. It opens on Jan. 8 and runs until Jan. 24. Don't miss it.
