When he left to become regional chairman, Tom Wood was appointed interim mayor and Winnie worked for him until the next election, when Fran Sainsbury was elected to the office.

"We had a lot of laughs, and one day at the office she turned up and we were wearing the same outfit, so she went home at lunch time and changed." When Wayne Emmerson took over the mayor's chair in 1994, Winnie had no trouble adjusting to his management style. "I loved working with Wayne and I think it was good that he went out (when he was) on top."

He had a special ability to put people at their ease, she noted. "We had quite a few Chinese delegations and they loved Wayne, even though they couldn't really speak English. All he could say (in Chinese) was 'Happy New Year'."

Since Winnie retired on Jan. 23, she hasn't had time miss work. "(Granddaughter) Jordan was born on Jan. 26, my first Monday at home, and I had Auston (her 2-year-old grandson) and the dogs to look after. And this is retirement," she said, with a cheerful grin.
