

# Stumbling through Stouffville with Bruce Stapley

#### The Battlefield Of Dreams

As I recall, it was a pleasant night back in May of 1982 that I marched my troupe of eager, and some not so eager, six and seven-year-olds onto the diamond for the opening game of the T-Ball Novice season at Stouffville's Franklin Park.

As a rookie Whitchurch-Stouffville Softball Association coach, I was as green as the grass we would play on. I had been told by the convener that it was all about having fun, that winning was almost irrelevant. Obviously, someone forgot to tell that to the opposition from Vandorf, which burst my naïve bubble with a romp over my less than stellar bunch that was accomplished with a military precision which would have made Tommy Franks beam with approval!

I would soon learn that softball, even at the neophyte T-Ball level, was played for keeps by the players and coaches from Vandorf and Goodwood. House league be damned, this was war.

While Stouffville teams consisted mostly of pint sized sand castlers and outfield idlers, these oversized invaders had a single-mindedness of purpose that was downright intimidating. Their coaches expected victory every time out, and would read the riot act to their young hot shots on those rare occasions when they found themselves behind in a game.

I continued to coach my son Shane's co-ed teams for four years, before bowing out by piloting my daughter Marissa's less than stellar squirt girls' squad to a mere two wins in 14 games in the summer of 1987 in what would be her only year in softball.

Sixteen years and a second family later, I'm dusting off the old clipboard and heading back to the diamond. Having got my feet wet by serving as third base coach for son Drew's Mite Boys house league crew last season, I've signed on to head up six-year-old Griffin's Five Pitch Advanced unit this year.

As it will be Griff's first year playing ball, I've been taking him and his brother over to the park since April to get him ready. And the little guy looks like he might just turn out to be a gamer, showing some serviceable form fielding grounders at second base. He's even caught a few pop ups – although he tends to play first base with his face at times!

Meanwhile, experience has taught me to utilize all my resources as a coach – in other words, delegate. Drew offered to do the initial phone around to tell the players when we were to start up, and my wife Sue has been roped in to serve as team scorekeeper. The first thing I planned for our initial practice was to commandeer a few base coaches and a bench coach to keep the batting order straight, along with a few extra assistants for when we go on holidays.

As for Griffin, he's falling into line just fine. The day after being told I would be running his team, he bid me a "Good night, Coach," before going to bed.

But from what I hear, Goodwood is still taking no prisoners on the house league circuit so it looks like we'll be taking our lumps once again.
