

Trains a no-GO after fire closes line

For a few days, an eerie calm descended on downtown Stouffville during the evening rush hour after a fire temporarily halted GO Train service on June 5.

Because shuttle buses were not available for Stouffville residents, local commuters had to make their own way to Mount Joy Station in Markham, or try to find space on the regular Uxbridge to Markham buses. And while it must have been extremely frustrating for all those affected, there was a certain retro pleasure to be had when strolling down Main Street at around 6 o'clock on a sunny Friday evening.

Instead of the usual string of stationary cars, their engines idling as they waited for the train to draw into the station, traffic moved with relative ease. The train's warning whistle, which has been. known to serve as a morning alarm for some in-town residents, was silenced and Main St. east of Ninth Line was, for a short time, country close to the city once more. Nostalgia notwithstanding, we strongly believe that public transit is an essential component of a viable, healthy community and hope that a more extensive service will convince more people to take advantage of it and leave their cars at home.

Now that York Region Transit is planning a bus route linking Stouffville to neighbouring centres, we trust that in future, residents will be offered alternative means of transportation in an emergency. After all, the cost of public transit accounts for a major portion of the taxes we all pay to the region, whether we live in Stouffville, Markham or Newmarket.

Meanwhile, we are pleased to note that a long-overdue cleanup of the Shoeless Joe's construction site at the Giant Tiger plaza is underway, following a meeting between the town and the restaurant owner. The construction delay was attributed to changes in the interior layout by the owner, but perhaps it would have been wiser not to start building until plans were finalized.

Now, is it too much to hope that the giant inflatable coffee mug perched on top of Country Style Donuts is just a temporary promotional gimmick? While no one is suggesting that the westend of town should be awarded a prize for esthetics or fine design, we do feel it would be considerably improved by the removal of this unlovely appendage.




