The Oral Health Corner Periodontal Disease: Keeping Your Teeth for Life!

The majority of us are familiar with the term Gingivitis. Essentially, gingivitis is a localized inflammation of the gums brought about by the presence of a foreign substance present on our teeth at the gumline – PLAQUE. Essentially, plaque is a conglomeration of billions of bacteria of many different types. The presence of these bacteria and their metabolites causes the human body to respond defensively through the process of inflammation. This translates to the experience of red, swollen gums that bleed easily upon brushing and flossing. Fortunately, with the implementation of proper oral hygiene, this condition is treatable and reversible.

But what is periodontal disease (aka. Periodontitis)? Periodontitis is when the prolonged accumulation of plaque and tartar on the teeth and gumline takes a more destructive course. This accumulation causes the same inflammatory response, but to the structures below the gumline. Most importantly, it is the bone (that anchors the roots of your teeth) below the gumline that is negatively affected. The inflammatory process here causes for the loss of bone around the roots of your teeth. This condition when left in a chronic state for many years will ultimately result in enough bone loss to contribute to the premature loss of your teeth. Unfortunately, in contrast to the reversible gingivitis, periodontitis is irreversible, meaning that once you lose supporting bone, it's gone FOREVER.

Understanding the nature of periodontitis is the best way to prevent it in the first place. This is mainly achieved by not allowing plaque and tartar to accumulate. This is prevented by proper flossing, brushing and professional care. Be sure to especially focus on keeping your gumline clean. For specifics on brushing, be sure to ask your hygienist or dentist at your next appointment.
