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A Step In The Right Direction

A recent CBC Radio report quoted two new American studies linking obesity and high blood pressure to suburban living.

The reason for this, the report noted, "was that people who live in the suburbs can't walk where they need to go as easily as people who live in cities. They use their cars a lot more."

Urban geographer Karen Tomic of the University of Alberta was quoted as saying, "What we know is the likelihood of someone being obese is much lower where they can walk to shops and services near where they live. We tend to see fast food outlets located on major arteries where there's a lot of car traffic. They're geared toward a car-oriented culture."

Sadly, our own community planners have embraced suburban sprawl with gusto. Sidewalks are either inadequate or non-existent in our brave new town and the majority of shops and services are located in areas which can hardly be described as pedestrianfriendly.

We believe that this issue should be front and centre as we approach the November municipal election. Although we cannot change what has already been approved and constructed, we can tell potential candidates for council that we would like to see more sidewalks and a renewed emphasis on our original downtown area.

Our former town hall, a fine heritage building, is being left to disintegrate. The patio area outside, which would make a fine location for a farmer's market, artist displays, musical performances or an outdoor cafe, is empty except during special events. Yet other communities have succeeded in recreating vibrant town centres, which can be reached as easily on foot as by car.

According to the CBC report, urban planners have become increasingly aware of potential health hazards posed by the suburban model. In the words of planner Austin French, "We create local service centres so that there's more commercial activities happening within proximity to the homeowner so they have more of a chance to walk for basic services."

One of the topics we focus on in this month's issue is health. We hope our new council will ponder the role they can play in promoting residents' health by creating an environment which encourages walking. If we want to maintain our small town atmosphere, we must take action now.

Otherwise, honesty will dictate that it's time for a new community slogan -- "Suburb close to the city."
