Samuel Lundy bequeaths his legacy

Samuel Lundy was among the original Quakers from Muncy County, Pennsylvania who settled in the hamlet of Pine Orchard, at the intersection of Warden Ave. and Vlvian Sideroad, in 1802.

He died in 1826, and his last will and testament is reproduced below:

"Considering the uncertainty of this mortal life, I, Samuel Lundy of the Township of Whitchurch in the County of York Home District and Province of Upper Canada Yeoman, being of sound and perfect mind, and memory, do make and publish this my last will and testament revoking all others that in manner and form following (that is to say):

"First I will and order that all my just debts and funeral charges shall be fully

settled and paid. To my son Ebenezer Lundy, I give and devise all my Homestead place containing one hundred and fifty acres more or less being the east end of lots number thirty one and thirty two together with the improvements, buildings, and farming utensils unto him the said Ebenezer Lundy his heirs and (assigns clear from all incumbrances) forever; I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife, a mare, and colt, and all the stock of cattle and sheep, also all the household furniture; I also give and bequeath her one hundred dollars; I also will and order that the house we now live in, the garden before the door and pasture lot back of the house shall be her property during her natural life, also a maintenance if required from off the place.

"I give and bequeath unto my daugh-

ter Elizabeth Lundy, fifty dollars, Likewise give and bequeath unto my son Samuel Lundy's widow the sum of fifty dollars, I further will and direct one lot of wild land being the seventh lot in the sixth concession of the Township of Scott, in the said province of Upper Canada to be sold and the price together with all the rest and residue and remainder of my personal property of what kind and nature so ever after the legacies above mentioned are paid the residue I give and bequeath to my ten children (to wit) Richard Lundy, William Lundy, John Lundy, Samuel Lundy, Ebenezer Lundy, Hannah Shotwell, Elizabeth Lundy, Anna Pettet and Sarah Walton to be equally divided between them, to share and share alike.

"And lastly I constitute and appoint Peter Wilson of the Township of Whitchurch in the said Province Yeoman and my son Ebenezer Lundy of the same place Yeoman, Executers of my last Will and Testament giving unto them full power and authority in any case of difficulty to settle the same by arbitration. In writing whereof I have here with my hand this fourth day of the seventh month A.D. one thousand eight-hundred and twenty one."

"Signed, Sealed published and declared by the said Samuel Lundy as his last will and testament in the presence of us (signed) who in his presence and in presence of each other have here unto subscribed Samuel Lundy our names."

(signed) Joseph Hillborn, Peter Willson, Asa Randale.

Stouffville Missionary Church

One hundred years can bring about remarkable change. This year marks Stouffville Missionary

Church's 100th year serving the community of Stouffville and ushers in perhaps the biggest change yet.

In 1903, the Evangelical Missionary Church (then known as the Mennonite Brethren in Christ) decided to build a church in the community of Stouffville. A lot was purchased in the spring of 1903 on the north side of Main Street and a new building was erected during that spring and summer for a total cost of about \$5000. A dedication service was held in November 1903.

As the community of Stouffville grew, so did the congregation at SMC. To better service the community, additions to the back and front of the building were made in 1948 and 1962. Even with these new additions, the constantly growing congregation found itself short on space. An adjacent house and lot east of the church was purchased in 1963. In April 1968, a groundbreaking took place to build a new sanctuary, leaving the original structure for a Christian education facility. At this time, an additional house and lot was purchased, which presently serves as the church offices. In September 1986, the 1903 building was demolished and replaced by a building, which houses a gymnasium, kitchen, and additional classroom space.

As was the case in the past, Stouffville Missionary Church has again outgrown its facilities. Through God's wonderful provision and leading, the construction of a new church facility on Tenth Line, near the water tower, is under way with completion expected by fall 2004.


On the weekend of November 14-16, 2003
