Free Trade And Protection. London, Eng., Dec. 18 .- (To the Edi tor): When times are reported to be bad in England and good on the continent, numbers of jeurnals and individuals proclaim the fact to hold up protectionist methods as being the eason of our neighbor's prosperity and our own adversity, It would no be out of place, therefore, to call attention to the present depression the continent, particularly in Germany. That is a high-protected country, yet nearly every industry is languishing, and the number of unemployed in

Berlin alone is over 80,000. If we had such a huge percentage of unemployed in London, the votaries of protection would say, What also can you expect if you allow our factories to be shut up by the free importation of manufactured goods? And it would probably be added : Place a duty on corn, so that wheat growing will become a profitable enterprise and the unemployed go back to the land If this fallacious argument contained an atom of truth, why is it not so in Germany, where grain is taxed up to the hilt? Instead of being a panacet there, the taxes on corn seem likely for cause a revolt, for already a petition against it, to be presented to reichstag, bears three million vigtatures to be increased to four millions.

Now, what do we find in free trade England? According to the board of trade reports, industries are in nor mercial and agricultural distress and want of employment are not the out come of free trade, and though, on the other hand, these evils are not reserved to protectionists' countries, th constant comparative well-being o the British trading community from the highest to the lowest, being so in disputably above that of neighbors ought to demonstrate to the world, without further arguments, the ad vantages of free trade.-ALFRED




