THE VETERANS' LANDS. Question as to The Most Suitable Location.

J. P. MacMilan, Guelph, has been investigating New Untario for the most suitable locations for the veterans. Robert Tribe was captain when at the front in 1866, and now resides at Emo P.O., Rainy River. He writes. The townships around here contain best of soil, capable of producing grain usually grown in other parts of Ontario, and besides it is exceedingly well suited for the raising of vege tables, which grow to immense size, stock thrive well and the land is easily cleared. A man can chop from a quarter to one half acre per day. though in some parts of the country it is heavily timbered, principally with popular balm of gilead, spruce, tamal rack, balsam and pine. As a rule there are few hills and yet the land is not altogether level, but somewhat rolling. Over the openings caused by the roads being chopped out, one can see across a whole township. In rare cases is there some muskeg and rock. On an average each lot or 160 acres has at least 125 or 140 acres of good land, and in most cases it is all good. My lot contains 160 acres, and there are only about six acres of it inferior. Prior to this the settiers were obliged to pay high prices for such as they required, but this is otherwise now in
