COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going on in the Business World—The Market News.

The Rockefeller interest in the city of Paris. Grand Trunk railway system earnings, Dec. 29 to 31st, 1901, \$779,027; 1900, \$834,100; decrease, \$55,073.

The number of postage stamps sold in Germany was 2,618,489,316 in 1900 and 2,954,854,308 in 1901.

The total trade with her colonies, England only passes 42, whilst the United States has 12 per cent, and that the latter is rapidly increasing her trade, not only with Canada, but with Australia, causing some disquiet.

According to the Railway Age there are now 260,000 miles of railroad in the United States. About 5,000 miles of track were added last year and 122,514 cars were built in this country, all of them for home use except 4,359, which were sold abroad.

The coffee importation of the United States for 1901 was the largest in the history of the import trade. The figures of the treasury bureau of statistics show that the importations of coffee amounted to more than 900,000,000 pounds in the eleven months ended with November, against 760,000,000 in the corresponding month in 1900.

TO BE AN EXPRESS COMBINE

THREE COMPANIES TO BE CONSOLIDATED INTO ONE.

Capital Is \$30,000,000—American, United States and Wells-Fargo Lines Are In The New Corporation.

New York, Jan. 8.—Announcement is made of the consolidation of the American, the United States and the Wells-Fargo express companies. It is understood that while all three corporations have agreed to the merger as a whole, they have not yet come together as to all the details of the gigantic plan.

The new combine, it is said, will be incorporated under the laws of the state of New Jersey, with a capital of about \$30,000,000.

THE BYE ELECTIONS.

They Are Held In A Good Many Places.

Montreal, Jan. 8.—By-election nominations for the house of commons are taking place in two constituencies in the Montreal district to-day, the one being St. James division, this city and Laval. Both vacancies were created through the sitting members, Messrs. Desmarais and Fortin being appointed to judgehips. In St. James division Albert Brunet secured the regular liberal nomination, J. A. Drouin retiring to avoid a split vote. J. G. H. Bergeron, ex-M.P. for Beauharnois, is the conservative candidate.

In Laval, so far as can be determined at present, there will be a three-cornered fight unless one of the candidates retires at the last moment. C. A. Wilson, of the city, is the regular liberal nominee, and E. Leonard, the conservative candidate. The third candidate is E. Goyer, independent liberal.

Weston, Ont., Jan. 8.—Nominations for the representation of West York were held here to-day. F. Wallace, merchant, Woodbridge, was nominated by the conservative party, and Archibald Campbell, merchant miller, Toronto Junction, for the liberals.

Bowmanville, Ont., Jan. 8.—Only two nominations for West Durham were made to-day: Robert Beith, farmer, of Bowmanville, liberal; and Charles Jonas Thornton, farmer of Clarke, conservative.

Napanee, Ont., Jan. 8.—The nomination of candidates for the house of commons, for the Addington by-election, was held to-day, at Yarker. Frank S. Wirtman, Yarker, is the liberal nominee, and M. Avery, Sharbot Lake, the conservative.

Quebec, Jan. 8.—Onsiphore Carbonneau, liberal, and Joseph Edouard Caron, independent, were nominated to-day for the representation of the county of L'Islet in the house of commons.

Sherbrooke, Que., Jan. 8.—Beland, liberal, was elected by acclamation in Beauce county, to-day.

SMALLPOX SITUATION.

There Have Been Over 1,900 Cases In Ontario.

Toronto, Jan. 8.—At the meeting of the provincial board of health, to-day, Dr. Bryce reported that, during 1901, there had been 1,900 cases of small-pox in Ontario. The chief centres of the outbreak were the unorganized districts of the north, with 750 cases Carleton county, 237; Kent county, 165 and Brant, 125. There have been only twelve deaths, showing that the disease was very mild. Dr. Bryce pointed out that in the United States, the mortality was becoming quite heavy, which fact, he said, was an ominous sign of a general increase in the virulence of the disease.

Is Going To Return.

Daniel Ely, who served in South Africa with the first Canadian contingent, and passed through the battle of Paardeberg, is going to return to the front with the Canadian field hospital corps. He enlisted to-day and will leave at once for Halifax. A second man is wanted from here, but up to three o'clock this afternoon he had not been selected.

A Literary Swindle.

Presently there will be liberated from Peterhead penitentiary the notorious Dr. James Colquhoun, ex-city treasurer of Glasgow corporation, who was sent into confinement for a series of heartless swindles on people who, misled by his professions of religion, his high standing in the city and his undoubted financial ability, intrusted him with their money for investment. We learn that he has occupied part of his time in prison by the writing of his life, with full details of his ongoings in Glasgow and abroad (where he was well known as "Jack Colquhoun"), and that the volume will be published shortly. It is odd, by the way, to read in Glasgow university calendar the entry, "Colquhoun, James, LL.D., Peterhead Prison, N.B., prisoner of the gentleman's interest in literature has been recognized by appointing him prison librarian."

Resolutions Passed.

Victoria, B.C., Jan. 8.—The Victoria board of trade has passed a resolution urging the dominion government to have Mr. Parks, the Canadian commissioner, return to Canada to confer with the boards of trade on Australian trade and particularly to inform the business men on the new condition arising out of the confederation of the Australian colonies. A committee was also appointed to draft a memorandum on trade to strengthen the hands of the Canadian premier at the conference of colonial premiers to be held in London.

A Serious Fire.

Sarnia, Ont., Jan. 8.—At noon to-day a serious fire occurred at the Cleveland, Sarnia, saw mill, where the company is drilling for salt. A vein of natural gas was struck and a terrific explosion ensued. The gas ignited from the tool sharpening forge and is burning fiercely. The drilling apparatus, derrick and engine-house caught fire, and are a total loss. The cause is still raging, and the best efforts of the firemen are being put forth to prevent the fire from spreading to the mill buildings proper. None of the drillers were hurt by the explosion.

Thomas Murphy, Sentenced.

Stearford, Ont., Jan. 8.—Thomas Murphy, found guilty here some days ago on a charge of stealing a valise and overcoat from the train between Stearford and St. Mary's, was to-day sentenced to five years in Kingston penitentiary. It is said that Murphy has a long record of crime, having served terms in both the central prison and the penitentiary at Kingston.

C. M. Hays, general manager of the Grand Trunk railway, accompanied by four car loads of officials of the road, passed through the city as they to-day, bound for Montreal.

A collision between trains occurred in the New York Central railway tunnel, at 86th street and Park avenue, New York city, in which a number of persons were killed and injured.

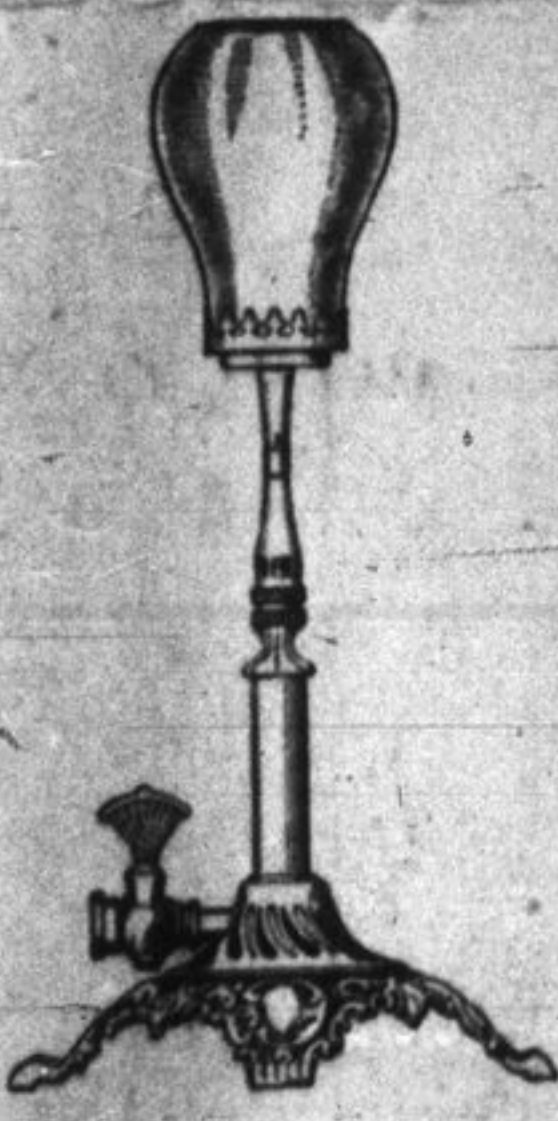
