NET DEATH IN THE DARK.

FRIGHTFUL SCENES IN NEW YORK CENTRAL TUNNEL.

Many Killed And Injured—Heroic Rescuers Imperil Their Lives to Release Victims—Cause of The Disaster—Engineer And Fireman Arrested.

New York, Jan. 9.—Down in the New York Central tunnel that burrowed under Park avenue, two trains met in collision at 8:17 o'clock, Wednesday morning, and fifteen passengers were killed and two and a half injured.

The official list of the dead, as made out by the police is as follows: Albert M. Perrin, 42 years old, secretary of the union being held prisoner in Chicago; D. C. Fickett, 46; A. E. H. Mills, 25; E. C. Hinsdale, 35; Mrs. A. E. Howard, 35; Frank Washburn, 55, president of the union being held prisoner in Chicago; Charles Lewis, 35, New Rochelle, general manager B. L. Altman & Co., dry-goods, New York; Theodore Forgard, 30; William Fisher, of Fort Lee, 25; William Howard, 48; Orestes Heyrowitz, 50, optician in business in this city, and secretary of the New Rochelle yacht club, Franklin Crosby, 25; Ernest F. Walton, 30; H. G. Diamond, assistant general manager of the American bridge company, in this city; Charles E. Marx, employed in the New York customs house.

Mr. and Mrs. Howard, who were said not to be related, Washburn and Walton, were scalded to death. The others met death by being crushed or mangled. All the dead resided at New Rochelle.

It was a rear-end collision between a South Norwalk local that was halted by block signals at the southern entrance to the tunnel and a White Plains local. Most of the death, injury and damage was wrought by the engine of the White Plains train, which plunged into the rear car of the South Norwalk train. It swept away the platform and wedged its way through the floor to the middle of the car, smashing the seats and furnishings and splitting the sides as it moved forward.

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A HORRIBLE CRIME.

Woman Murdered at Obscure Point on Lake Champlain.

North Hero, Vermont, Jan. 9.—From an obscure place, known as Pointe au Faucon, on the New York side of Lake Champlain, comes the report of the murder of Miss Sophia Mannin. It is claimed that the woman was sacrificed in the course of a fight over her body between two intoxicated men, and that after she was dead alcohol was poured upon her body, and it was set on fire. The men, Eli Cameron and Edward Dupe, had been arrested and taken to jail.

According to information at hand, Miss Mannin for some time has been housekeeper for Cameron, a fisherman. Not far from Cameron's home lived his friend Edward Dupe, whose wife died about three weeks ago. Wish was to get some one to keep house for him Dupe made an offer to Miss Mannin, but she had not accepted.

On January 2d the men met at Cameron's camp, and after drinking the men began discussing the question of who should have the services of Miss Mannin. The men soon began to fight with knives. The woman attempted to separate them and was fatally stabbed. To destroy traces of the murder it was thought alcohol was poured over the woman and ignited. The men left the place immediately. Three days later a man went to Cameron's house and on the floor found the dead body of the woman. The men were found, arrested and taken to jail at Plattsburgh. Miss Mannin was about forty years old, and belonged to a respectable family of Ross's Point.

WILL NOT STAND. William Kelly Not a Candidate This Time.

William Kelly, trades union organizer, asked to contest the bye-election in the labor interests, decided not to accept the invitation. To the Whig, this morning he made the following statement: "I believe that to a very marked degree, parliamentary honors should be given to the man, and that no man should thrust himself, or be, by a mere handful of electors, into a position of honor and responsibility to which he is not entitled."

Two Soldiers Out For a Lark—One Was Fined.

At the police court this morning Mrs. Fradette and Hubley, who had been charged with drunkenness and assault, were fined \$10 and \$20 respectively. The evidence of Mr. Bibby was sufficient to show that at about twelve o'clock last night he missed two fox terrier dogs from in front of his house at 1100 Brook street. In the latter case, Hubley was fined \$10 and Hubley \$20.

HE IS SUING FOR DAMAGES.

RAILWAY OFFICIALS SHOULD HAVE PROTECTED HIM.

A Suit Brought by a Man Who Had Been Assaulted—Means by Which City Folks Might Return to the Farms.

Toronto, Jan. 9.—A deputation representing societies engaged in social reform work, this morning, waited upon Hon. Mr. Lashford, to ask that the labor bureau system be extended to include agencies in cities and manufacturing centres throughout the province.

At Osgoode hall this morning a consent order was made at the instance of Henry Jolly, the petitioner in the North Wellington election case, with the concurrence of E. Tolton, M.P., extending for two months from January 1st, the date for the hearing of the petition against Mr. Tolton's return.

SAVED FROM TETANUS. Describes The Frightful Agony Of Lockjaw.

Trenton, N.J., Jan. 9.—William Chumley, who was saved from death by lockjaw by the use of tetanus antitoxin, injected into the muscles of his back, is now able to describe his intense suffering. He talked to-day while sitting up in his cot in St. Francis hospital where he has been for the last four weeks. He can now open his jaws about one inch, after their being tightly locked for nearly a month.
