WIDOW WILL BE PUT ON TRIAL FOR MURDER.

Must Know Murderer-Suspected That Son Of Husband's he went to New York and then Business Partner Was The Man -He Is Under Arrest Also-Caught In the Far West.

Platisburg, Mo., Jan. 15.-Mrs. Addie L. Richardson; a handsome young widow, was placed on trial here to day for her life. She is accused of the murder of her millionaire husband. Frank W. Richardson, a merchant of Savannah, Mo., on Christmas eve

The arrest in North Yakima, Wash. on Jan 6th, of Stewart Fife, the son of the murdered man's business partner, under indictment for the Richardson murder, gives promise that the mystery surrounding the tragedy may be unravelled. Everyone is wondering where, if it is unravelled, Mrs. Richardson will be left. If it is proven, as the prosecution promises to prove, that Stewart Fife, surprised in Mrs. Richardson's company by a wronged husband, shot him down to avoid exposure, will Mrs. Richardson be held
