HON. MR. SUTHERLAND. The Hon. Mr. Sutherland has been assigned the office of marine and fisheries, which Sir Louis Davies resigned in order to accept a seat in the supreme court bench. Mr. Sutherland has for some time had a seat in the cabinet without a portfolio, and has rendered efficient and useful service during the illness and absence of his colleague. He is a man of great activity, and has, by his intelligent and well-directed energies in the cause of liberalism, secured the recognition he has received from time to time. The marine department is one which involves careful supervision, and to the duties of it Mr. Sutherland is sure to bring the attention, alertness and the experience which have characterized him all through his long political career. His success the Whig predicts, and it offers its congratulations.

A CREDITED KINGSTON. The electors of Kingston have spoken in regard to the common's bye-election, and as they were expected to do. The candidate who promised, by his past record, to be most useful to the city, has been elected by a majority of 752. It may be said that a bye-election is pretty sure to go with the government. And so it is—when the government is popular, when it has made an earnest effort to promote the public interest, when it has taken advantage of every condition to make the people prosperous. But the conservative party remembered that bye-elections had been carried, and they claimed to have a candidate who had been a winner in every contest, who had "sent his opponent sprawling in the dust," as one speaker put it, and amid a great noise he was entered for the race. There was much boasting on the conservative side. In their minds they had won the election several times before the polling day arrived. In their last rally they imagined a lot of things—that did not happen. So when election day did come, and there was work to do, many of them were missing.

Two points have been made clear as a result of the campaign. (1) The electors have demonstrated that they cannot be misled or misdirected by catch cries. They realized, with a glance at their records, the candidate they ought to support, and gave him their votes. The workingmen are not beguiled by fulsome idolatry. (2) The public have fittingly expressed their gratitude to the man who has been so good—a friend of Kingston. His interests are here, interests that affect many hundreds favorably, and these interests have been made the more permanent and aiding by his election. The citizens have done themselves honor in their decision in this case, and the member-elect, Hon. Mr. Hart, will bring them credit by the manner in which he will carry himself in the commons.

ENDORSEMENT OF THE GOVERNMENT. The Laurier government should be very well satisfied with the elections that took place yesterday. They show that public feeling is still running, and running strongly, with the party which is in power. This is a significant circumstance, some experience in Canada and England goes to show that when a government is not held in high esteem, when it is lacking in force, in power, in administration capacity, it loses its hold upon the people, and it is evidenced by the capture of seat after seat by the opposition in the bye-elections.

West Hastings was expected to go conservative. Mr. Corby held it from 1891 till his resignation, and then Porter has only secured it by the Corby influence. Addition seems to remain conservative, but the returns are incomplete. West York was represented by the late Clark Wallace in several parliaments. He had won in every election since 1878. His brother sought to take his place, and he was opposed by that stalwart liberal, Archibald Campbell, formerly of Kent, and one of Ontario's most experienced campaigners. His election is a tribute to his ability, and a public appreciation of his political prestige.

West Durham has returned to its first love in the re-election of Mr. Both, who has defeated his unsuccessful opponent in the general election. Outside of those the great struggle was in Montreal, in St. James' division, where the contestants were Ald. Brunet and Mr. Bergeron. There were two liberal candidates in the field when Mr. Bergeron, one of the French conservative leaders, was brought from Beauharnois and nominated. The idea was that he should run in between the liberals. One of them was at once retired and Mr.

Bergeron was guaranteed the whipping which was duly administered at the polls. There is no greater demagogue in Canada than Mr. Bergeron, and he is where he will do the least harm—outside of parliament. Laval, made vacant by the elevation of Mr. Fortin to the bench, and L'Islet, made vacant by the appointment of Mr. Duchene to the senate, did not go as expected. In Laval, with two liberals and a conservative running Mr. Leonard, conservative, won out. In L'Islet, Mr. Caron, independent liberal, was returned. In West Prince, P.E.I., Mr. Forquharson, the late liberal premier of the province, was triumphantly elected to succeed Hon. Mr. Davies, elevated to the bench. The government will be strengthened by these accessions to the house, and it opens its second session of this parliament with the consciousness that it has been endorsed afresh by the electors. For the fact that three constituencies in Ontario, two in Quebec, and one in Prince Edward Island (West Prince), went liberal on the one day, and that only two, in Ontario, and one in Quebec went conservative, must be accepted as a fair indication of the direction and import of public opinion.

EDITORIAL NOTES. The men who cheer after the battle is over seem to cheer the loudest. A man who has had seventeen years of parliamentary life ought to be satisfied. So the electors think. The grain shovellers knew what has knocked them out of work here. And it wasn't the liberal government. Personalities in politics do not pay. There was too much of a personal nature on the conservative side, and it has now to be repented of. The workingmen have answered the appeals that have been made to them through the ballot. There is no doubt about where they stand. The students were out yesterday and very active in Mr. Hart's interest. And they know who has been the friend of Queen's college. Sympathy is all right in its place. Some men profess to be great admirers of Mr. Metcalfe, and so anxious for his election. Where were they yesterday when there was work to do? A bill has been introduced into the new York legislature which aims to stop flitting on the street cars, and imposes a fine of \$500 for any one who is convicted of the offence. If this thing goes through with the man or woman with the goo-goo eyes. Mr. Foster helped to kill Mr. Wallace in West York. He undertook to convince the market gardeners that they had a grievance against the government, and he has profited by his experience. The idea of a man who poses as a statesman talking peanut politics. Senator Landerkin has turned up the records to show that a conservative government offered to recruit Canadians for Egyptian service at the imperial government's expense, and the offer was not accepted. Which would seem to put some of the cavilers out of the business. Peace is all the talk again. The pro-Ber element in the United States thinks it has only to select the president and Wilhelmina, of Holland, and the South African war will be settled. If Mr. Chamberlain talks as sharply to these people as he does to the Germans he will tell them to mind their own business.

The Mail is annoyed because Mr. Howland, the mayor, does not suit all people. It finds that the principal objection to him is that he is a conservative. By the same token it could find, if it required, that his claims to election and re-election is that he was a party man of the blue-blooded sort. Prohibition In Nova Scotia. Halifax, N.S., Jan. 16.—The prohibitionists of Nova Scotia met in convention at Truro Tuesday. Over a hundred delegates present. A resolution was passed the effect that the convention present a petition to the Nova Scotia legislature at the approaching session asking the passage of a law prohibiting the liquor traffic in Nova Scotia. A committee of twenty was appointed, to wait upon the legislature and to cooperate in securing the legislation.

TALKS WITH CANNIBALS. Reasons Given For Practices Of Anthropophagy. William Durban in London Outlook. The Wodeid expedition which recently traversed a region of dense forest back of the Ivory coast in West Africa, found there a large number of cannibals comprising several tribes. They are only about 120 miles from the coast and within a week's journey of the French posts. Cannibals have seldom been found in Africa so near the sea. As a rule they do not live within 550 miles of the ocean and most of them are still farther inland. There are no cannibal tribes, for example, on the lower part of the Congo river, though the middle and upper Congo basin are the greatest hot bed of cannibalism in the world. When the white men in the Wodeid party asked these cannibals why they indulged in the practice of eating human flesh they replied that men are in the habit of washing their bodies three times a day, and their flesh therefore is cleaner and sweeter than that of cattle which are never washed.

When Mr. Stanley sent Capt. Coquilhat to occupy the station he had established among the fierce Bangalla cannibals of the middle Congo he found the natives ever ready to devour flesh. "This is horrible," said Coquilhat one day to a chief whom he saw at his meal. "On the contrary it is delicious with salt," was the reply. Another time the Belgian soldier expressed his abhorrence to a chief who was about to sit down to a cannibal banquet. The latter replied to his protests: "When you kill a goat I do not interfere. This deer, however, is my property. I did not steal nor capture him, but I bought him with good cloth and I will eat him if I please." One day Coquilhat pointed out the male and tried to convince the natives that to eat a man was to make a very bad use of him and to degrade their species. A bright fellow in the crowd called out in answer: "All you talk of is the eating of human flesh is the best sort of food while the flesh of mere animals is a vile sort of nutriment."
