Cabinet Ministers' Salaries.

Reosevelt's cabinet are very rich, and this fact has drawn attention to the necessity of cabinet ministers at Washington, being men of considerable private fortune. It is said that Mr Gage had to spend \$100,000 a year in excess of his salary, and that other cabinet ministers have had to spend large sums in order to respond to the demands of society. At Ottawa, the cabinet ministers do not receive large enough salaries to maintain their position properly. A table showing the transactions of failure is supposed to have been the the government savings banks of Can-cause of death. 1901, compiled by the Insurance and Finance Chronicle, is a striking com mentary upon the present prosperity of the country and the thrift of the working classes. The total deposits grew from \$1,994,565 in 1867-68 to \$15,373,124 in 1878-79; \$49,472,992 in 1885-86, 852,109,065 in 1890-91, 862, 387,213 in 1898-99, and 868,712,057 in 1900-1901, the business thus increasing thirty-four times in thirty-four years. We doubt if there are many countries in which this result would have been possible or in which the average of comfort is so high.
