Man Who Smoked 150,000 of the "Paper Torches."

St. Joseph, Mich., Jan. 18 .- Arthur his dead friends Frazee, son of J. W. Frazee, died in a room in hotel Brandon, Alexandria, Ind. Frazee had gained the reputation of having smoked more cigarettes than any other person in southwestern Michigan. It is reported that the ill ffect of cigarettes was the direct cause of his death. Mr. Frazee, when questioned as to the number of cigarettes he had smoked, stated that he would average thirty cigarettes a day. had been a constant cigarette smoke for the past twelve years, and with an average of thirty cigarettes a day during the last twelve years of his life he has smoked 150,000 cigarettes.


