

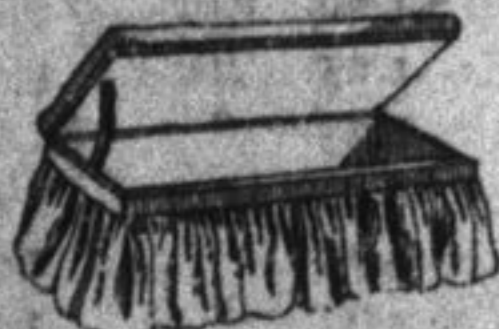

THE NEW COMMITTEE MEETS FIREMAN'S FINE WILL NOT BE REMITTED.

Considering a Scheme For The Grading of Salaries of Firemen—An Account For Hire of Rig.

The initial meeting for 1902 of the civic committee on fire and light was convened Friday afternoon at four o'clock, with chairman Bell presiding. Those attending were Alds. Farrell, King, Harkness, McFarlane, and city engineer Kirkpatrick.

Chairman Bell in opening proceedings, stated that he had accepted the office of chairman with reluctance and timidity. He followed a chairman whom he considered one of the best of the year occupied the position and he was glad that the ex-chairman was now a member of the committee, so that the other members might receive the benefit of his counsel, based on experience.

Ald. Harkness took the ground that Mr. McErmott had no right to rent a rig to the city; he did not pay a license for that purpose.

Ald. McFarlane and Craig had been appointed a sub-committee to procure a rig for the fire department while one owned by the city was being repaired.

Before they had secured one, the chief of the department reported that he had procured one that was suitable. The committee were not aware that the hire of the rig was to be paid for.

Upon motion, it was decided to refer the account to the chairman and city engineer to wait upon the committee and arrange a settlement of the account, subject to the approval of the committee.

The matter of equipping the city buildings with Swani dry powder fire extinguishers, was allowed to stand as the budget was not yet considered.

The application of W. A. McGill, V.S., for appointment as veterinary to the fire department, was tabled, there not being a vacancy.

John Lennon, driver for the fire department, applied for payment of \$37.50, wages stopped by way of a fine for misconduct.

Ald. Harkness moved that the prayer of the firemen be granted. Ald. Farrell took the ground that it would not be in the best interests of the discipline of the brigade to remit the fine. He was thoroughly in sympathy with the family of Mr. Lennon, but the interests and efficiency of the brigade must be maintained.

Ald. King supported Ald. Farrell's stand on the question. Ald. Harkness' motion was lost, he alone supporting it on a vote being taken.

The matter of an increase in wages to the firemen, as petitioned for, was laid over for further consideration, as chairman Bell had some information to lay before the members, regarding a definite scale.

Ald. Farrell would like to see an arrangement determined whereby a fireman's length of service, efficiency and conduct would tell towards payment of highest scale of wages. He was of opinion that the men should be paid better wages, and the reason that the question was not taken up last year was because the firemen's petition came in late and the committee could not go beyond payment of salaries provided for by budget.

Last year's committee did not want to make a recommendation to the committee of this year for fear such action would be wrongly construed. On motion of Ald. Farrell, it was decided to purchase a book in which to keep a record of individual accounts, expenditures, so that at any time the committee can tell just how much money has been spent, and for what purpose.
