The four are Prefontaine, Dr. Lachapelle, R. Wilson-Smith, and James Cochrane, M.L.A., for St. Lawrence division. Mr. Prefontaine has already occupied the civic chair for four years and seeks another term of two years. Dr. Lachapelle, as the candidate of both English and French electors, who think that Mr. Prefontaine has had enough; and R. Wilson-Smith is the candidate of the Enlish electorate who think it should be the turn of an English mayor. Dr. Lachapelle's supporters claim that an Englishman cannot be elected against Prefortaine, so that a Frenchman must be brought against him. Mr. Cochrane is the choice of another English and

THE BILL AS TO THE DAIRY ASSOCIATIONS.

Asking For a Winding-Up Order For the Guelph Brass And Electrical Company-Much Of The Capital Yet Unpaid. Toronto, Jan. 20 .- Mr. Dryden will

introduce a bill dividing the dairy associations of the province, now known as the Ontario and Eastern Ontario association, into the Eastern and Western. A grant of \$1,000 a year will be given to each instead of \$900 to the Ontario association and \$400 to the Eastern as present. Quite a number of Guelph people are

interested in the failure of the Canada brass and electric company, which was before chief justice Meredith this morning on an application of R. B. Beaumont, on behalf of the secretary, for a winding up order. Mr. Beaumont admitted insolvency, but the judge said it would be very much better for the board of the company to admit insolvency by resolution before he grants the order. The failure is a pretty bad one. The company started with \$20,000 of subscribed capital and there are still \$7,000 worth of stock unpaid for, which subscribers are liable. The company's liabilities are about \$12,000 and the assets for the unpaid stock are prac-

DIED AT DAWSON.

Maudson, B.A., Succumbs

To Typhoid Fever. The sad intelligence was received the city on Satarday of the death, at Dawson City, on December 24th last of George A. Maudson, B A., son-inlaw of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Cousins, 274 University avenue. A circumstance that renders the death more distressing still, is the fact that his wife and child were in Kingston, and that no one sent them any intelligence, or, having sent it, that it has not yet arrived. The intelligence was received through a Nanaimo, P.C.

Mr. Maudson died on December 24th from the effects of a long illness of typhoid fever. He went to the Yukon in June last, from Nanaimo, where he held the position of assistant master in the high school. At Dawson City he expected to take charge of the high school there, but as it was not to be opened until the following September, he accepted the position of deputy commissioner of the census, under Maj. Woodside. It was while in the employ of the government that he contracted his fatal disease, owing to the exposure sustained by going down the river in a boat. The deceased was born at Mitchell, Ont, twenty-seven years ago, Two si-ters and two brothers, still living

near his native town, survive. Mr Maudson was an arts graduate of Queen's college, taking the degree of B.A. in 1898. When he left Nanaimo for the Yukon Mrs. Maudson and their little year and a half old daughter came east to remain with her parents.
