



Widow Tried To Jump To Death, But Dress Caught In Shutter. New York, Jan. 27 .- While a band of forty pieces was playing a dirge in front of the house of Nicholas Soranto, a wealthy Italian, who died on Sunday of preumenia, at No. 235 Bedford avenue, Willinsburg, widow, crased with grief, jumped from a third storey window. "Man Full Of Needles" Dead. Louisville, Ky., Jan. 27 -- W. L. Booker, "the man full of needles, died sucklenly on Friday at the home of his daughter. Booker formerly lived with another daughter in Taylorsville, and, while living with her, he sat on a cushion full of needles. Most of them were imbedded in the flesh Some of them were taken out by a country physician, but most of them remained in the flesh. Since that time the needles have been working out in the most unexpected places, coming from his fingers and toes, arms and legs. Coroner Kelly is of the opinion that one of the peedles attacked the man's heart, and caused death. An autopsy will be held to determine this
