

THE DRIFT OF TRADE.

The Whig has already said that the address of Charles A. Gardiner, be fore the New York Credit Men's association, was a remarkable one, and it is bound to suggest thought on the part of all who read it.

The question was the expansion of America's commerce. It was pointed out that more than half of the United States trade was done with Great Britain and her dominions, that during the past third of a century British expansion had been phenomenal. and that the American-British trade had increased in exact proportions. "But," says Mr. Gardiner, "England demands no reciprocity. She has adjusted herself to our protective system, and so long as that policy substantially maintained with her and her European trade rivals, so long will she give us free trade, and she can do nothing more. Hence our British commerce, if expanded at all must be expanded by other means

than reciprocity." Mr. Gardiner refers to certain hostile movements in Europe, but considers them of no serious account. He looks to Canada, however, for a great growth in trade, The preference tariff adopted by Canada did not build up a British trade at the expense of the American.
