Victoria, B.C., Jan. 31.-There is still no news of the H.M.S. Condor. H.M.S. Egeria and U.S.S. Grant are cruising on the west coast seeking for wreckage and H.M.S. Phaeton and U. S.S. McCulloch are cruising the waters of the north Pacific between the latitude of the Columbia river and Honolulu in the hope of finding the overdue sloop of war. That the Condor has met with an accident, as result of the heavy storms, seems certain, and the greatest hopes held for her are that she may be found a help-

Of the Condor's 140 men, some are servivors of the earlier fights of the war against the Boers in South Africa.
