THE FUN ENDED IN DEATH.

FATAL COASTING ACCIDENT OCCURS AT KEESEVILLE.

Wilfrid Graves Killed And His Sister And Another Lady Badly Crushed And Are Likely To Die.

PLATTSTOWN, N.Y., Jan. 31.—A fatal coasting accident occurred at Keeseville last evening, in which one young man was killed and two young women fatally injured. A large party was coasting on Academy hill, using a large boat, holding from ten to twenty people. The boat became unmanageable and ran into a telegraph pole, while going at great speed. Wilfrid Graves, aged twenty-three years, was almost instantly killed, and his sister, Miss Rachael Graves, and Miss Edith Bulley were crushed so that it is feared they cannot survive. Among the others hurt were Henry Miles, broken leg; John King, arm broken; George La Duke, arm dislocated. The young people are of the best families in Keeseville.

Kingston Flyers Will Go To Cape Vincent.

Francis H. Macnee, secretary-treasurer of the Kingston ice yacht club, has received the following communication from W. F. Clark, secretary-treasurer of the Cape Vincent ice yacht club:

"The Cape Vincent ice yacht club invites the Kingston ice yacht club to compete with them for a small silver loving cup given by the commodore and also for two purse races of twenty-five dollars each, weather and ice permitting, and dates being agreeable to your club. First purse race will be called Tuesday morning, January the eleventh, at half past ten o'clock and will be open to first class yachts.
