R. company to locate its proposed big works here, instead of at Montreal, as at present contemplated. The company has in view the locating at some convenient point mammoth workshops that will employ 7,000 men and I submit that Kingston is the most desirable city for such a plant. There are many reasons that can be advanced in behalf of Kingston, and I feel assured that if these were properly laid before the directors of the company they would carry such weight that the works would be secured for Kingston, Strike while the iron is bot; do not wait until some other city has gobbled up the plant.
