John Clements, Arthur, dropped dead in the hospital at Guelph.

Mrs. Gibson, Beamsville, wife of William Gibson, ex-M.P., is dead.

The funeral of Rev. Father Bedard, parish priest of St. Constant, Que., will take place Friday, 7th inst.

Col. Piquart has obtained judgment restoring his papers, seized at the time of the Breton agreement.

James McMillan, ex-M.P., Wellington, may be called to the senate in the place of the late Hon. G. W. Allard.

H. Hastings has been re-nominated conservative organizer in Manitoba to prepare for the provincial general elections.

The will of the late Walter S. Lee, Toronto, is probated. The total amount is \$27,000, and is left wholly to the family.

The rugby football match between Wales and Scotland resulted in a win for the Welshmen, the score being 10 to 0.

Louis Wessel's commando is active in the Cradock district of Cape Colony. It held up and partly burned a supply train last Saturday.

F. L. Biquard, ex-M.P., Montreal; D. P. Thompson, Fredericton; Hon. J. E. Church, Chester, N.S.; an E. R. Robertson, Montague, P.E.I., have been appointed senators.

Advices from Nome state that two girls contracted a dance hall recently committed suicide by taking carbolic acid. Despondency is ascribed as the cause. They were known as the Carlisle sisters.

Samuel A. Bell, a Toronto blacksmith, is charged with stealing \$500 from Miss Mary Stewart. Bell was engaged to Miss Stewart and borrowed her money. Monday he married another woman and was arrested.

It is stated that an agreement has been signed by the steamship lines for an increased and uniform minimum saloon passenger rate, and for the extension of the summer season.

The Cardiff committee of the tramway companies has excluded the German tenders for supplying generators for the new electric system, although they were the lowest of any submitted.

The committee is considering only English and American offers.

Ronald A. Stewart, the liberal candidate in Leggar, is teacher of the public school at Balderson's Corners, Lanark county, where R. L. Richardson, the independent candidate, was a pupil at the same school. Mr. Stewart is now a farmer at Pilot Mound.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

The City's Opportunity.

Kingston, Feb. 5.—(To the Editor): I have been waiting for some days to hear of the city council's decision on the question of attempting to induce the C. P. R. company to locate its proposed big works here, instead of at Montreal, as at present contemplated.

There are many reasons that can be advanced in behalf of Kingston, and I feel assured that if these were properly laid before the directors of the company they would carry such weight that the works would be secured for Kingston.

Strikes while the iron is hot; do not wait until some other city has grabbed up the plant. The city owns a large tract of land lying north of the cotton mill that is available to its needs, giving the lead to the company, and as much more if required and it is obtainable.

This would make an admirable site for such works as the company proposes to erect here, and it is available to the city within a couple of hundred yards of railroad tracks. The company, also, intends, it is said, erecting extensive coal docks at Kingston; what would be more desirable than to have the plant and the coal docks together?

The coal could be brought over from New York state at low cost for freightage and would be convenient to the works and tracks. These desirable facts should be made known to the company without delay.

If the company would prefer the site of the fair grounds, why, turn that place over to the railroad men; if occupied by railroad shops it would be a great advantage to the city, rather than it does under present conditions.

The city can afford to make many sacrifices if assured that the permanent location is secured here of works that will employ anywhere from 1,000 to 2,000 men. This matter ought to be taken hold of by the city's ablest men and pushed to conclusion. If a delay is made, the result may be most disastrous for the city. Kingston is suffering greatly in the past from the anti-expansion principle that seems to have permeated business principles here; let a new era dawn for the city's prosperity.—ELECTOR.

DOCTORS WILL DECIDE UPHOLD PROTESTANTISM.

A Great Gathering in London on Tuesday Night.

London, Feb. 5.—At a meeting at Albert hall, last evening, the gigantic building was packed with enthusiasts pledged to uphold the Protestantism of the nation and to demand the suppression of the mass and ecclesiastical in the Established Church into which, it is contended, they have been introduced through the government's abuse of patronage and by certain bishops in defiance of the law.

Viscount Midleton presided, supported by Lord Kinnaird and Lord Overton, some members of parliament, prominent evangelical clergymen, and the anti-ritualist look-alike, Kemist. The speeches declared that there was a conspiracy afoot to undermine the Protestant religion, and denounced the dangers of the introduction into Great Britain of bodies of celibate, militant Catholics, who profess to be driven out of their own country by persecution.

Resolutions embodying the objects of the meeting were passed with unanimous fervor. One of these insisted upon the retention in the sovereign's oath of the rejection of the "distinctive errors of the church of Rome." Another condemned excessive governments for allowing violations of the law, forbidding monks and Jesuits to reside in Great Britain, the existence of such communities in the country being pernicious to society and dangerous to good government.
