PERPETRATORS WILL BE PUN ISHED WITH DEATH.

Anti-Anarchist Bill-United States Committee On Judiciary Favorably Reports It -Protection For Foreign Rul-

Washington, Feb. 11 .- Senator Hoar, terday favorably reported a bill for the protection of the pre ident of the United States, the vice-precident, and others. It provides that any person who shall within the limis of th United States, or any place subject to its jurisdiction, wilfully kill or cause the death of the president or vice predent, or any officer in line of suc ression, or who shall wilfully cause the death of the sovereign or chief angistrate of any foreign country shall be punished with death. An at tempt to commit either of the oliences mentioned is also punishable by

The bill also provides a punishment of twenty years for the person or persons found guilty of instigating, advising, or counselling the killing of any of the persons named, and any persons who shall wilfully and knowingly aid in the escape of any person guilty of the offences mentioned shall be deemed an accomplice and manished the same as if a principal. Imprisonment of five years is proided for persons convicted of uttering words, spoken or published, which threaten to kill or advise or instigate

to kill the rersons named. A new feature in connection with the proposed law is that the secretary of war is authorized and directed to select a detail from the regular army to guard and protect the person of


