with legislation of that kind. He said: "What we propose to ask is not. shall we prohibit the retail sale of intoxicating liquors? That would be but a small matter. The bar-rooms are bad enough, God knows; but they are not as bad as the canteen in the private homes. Talking About City And Provincial Affairs.

Toronto, Feb. 10 .- The suggestion that ladies representing prominent women's organizations be appointed the industrial exhibition board, met with the general approval of the sky council Control co canam has championed the measure and is being humorously twitted by his fellow councillors for being a lady's man. Unless something unforeseen comes up, the exhibition board will bave representatives from the national council of women and the women's christian temperance union, and probably others.

The Pan-American exposition board ound the services of a national board of women of vital necessity in catering to the tastes of every class; woman's voice is necessary in claiming the proper indulgences for woman's handiwork. In the exhibition marked at tention should be paid things of terest to the home and its beautifying: the mother, the matron of the home, the guardian angel of its sanctity and beauty should be consulted.

Public ownership of public utilities is growing sentiment all over Ontario. Even within the sanctity of the legislative assembly the voice of the new gospel has been heard. Not from any one party has it come, it is the new proclamation of a democratic desire by the public to rid themselves of the ommerce-crushing, and trade-menacing blight of private greed. Andrew Patullo's speech in the house was punctured with unstinted applause from both sides. As a newspaper man he gave the benefit of years of careful study of the question. Newspaper men in the main, are among the most public-spirited citizens. The ordinar editor is as vitally interested in such questions as public ownership as his neighbors, perhaps more so.

If everything the horse breeders' as sociation threatened at their annual meeting the other day is carried into effect, the horse show this year will be minus many attractions. A deputation was appointed to consult with the hunt club and suggest holding the show not later than the first week in April. Provided the wishes of the association are not carried out they will out loose and the horse show will suffer. The question of the importation of American bronchos was also discussed, and a committee was appointed to co-operate with the Manitoba horsebreeders' association in securing the aid of the federal authorities to prevent such traffic being carried on. t was shown that many horses south of the line had been brought in and so priced as to make the duty in some ases as low as \$3, while \$30 was the minimum duty on horses going from anada to the United States.

Col. Leys, M.L.A. (London) was one f the speakers. He advocated gov ernment support in the matter of dis tributing prizes among the farmers for brood mares exhibited at the big fairs throughout the province. Some of the speakers deprecated the idea. anadian farmer raising army horses. It leads to the production of a cheap article. Certainly if this is to be the tendency from such a policy let it be abandoned at once. What will best serve to stimulate the Canadian horse trade is to produce the best horses that can be produced and the market will be looking for Canadian "goods" in a hurry. It was dwelt upon in more than one address that Ontario breeders should look more to the west

for a market than to England. The Pettypiece bill recently introduced in the legislature has started a storm of comment on the matter of railway taxation. Mr. Pettypiece said that Ontario in her railways had source of two and one half million dol lars yearly revenue to draw from. Railways in nearly all of the states in the union were taxed and they yielded a good revenue too. However, there is another side which must be consid ered. In case such taxation was levi-Jed on the Ontario railways what power would the province have to prevent an increase in freight and transportaion charges which a railway might easily levy with impunity in order to increase their earnings to meet the increased taxation. There is a marked difference in the amount of taxation of the railways in the several states as compared with Ontario. The spur of the Grand Trunk running through Indiana under the name of Chicago and Grand Trunk pays just ten times the amount in taxes that a similar line of the same road pays in Ontario.

There are several different methods of levying taxes however which have been tried and successfully used; the tax on mileage, the tax on the gross earnings, holding shares in capital stock and drawing dividends. The latter method might work with some railroads but with others the taxes received would be rather small. would manifestly be unfair to tax a young road, such as the Algoma Central which is but in its infancy, on the same basis as the C.P.R. or Grandel Trunk if it would be fair to tax it at


