COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going on in the Business World—The Market News.

Ireland has only 330,000 acres of forest, as against ten million acres under grass. There has been a strong demand lately for lace curtains; the remanence lace effect is new and very pretty.

The street railways in Canada have 675 miles of track. The Montreal line carries 45,533,652 passengers, nearly eight million more than Toronto.

There is a firm feeling in prints and cotton goods in the domestic markets. The mills are busy and are not inclined to make any concessions in value.

Grand Trunk's earnings from July 1st to the end of the first week in February amount to \$18,018,266 against \$17,280,049 last year, an increase of \$738,217.

Enough timber is destroyed by fire in this country every year to supply all the pulp mills, though these can turn out 2,500,000 tons of paper in a year.

The yield of cranberries for 1901 was as follows: New England, 240,000 barrels; New Jersey, 120,000 barrels; the west, 40,000 barrels, a normal crop.

An enquiry has been received at Glasgow regarding the shipment of Scotch pig iron to America. Iron masters, commenting on the equality state that it indicates an iron famine in the United States.

The Montgomery cotton company has notified the Montreal Stock exchange that, owing to the state of the cotton trade, the company would not pay the quarterly dividend. Last summer it was 14 per cent. per annum. The company is capitalized at \$700,000.

While February will show up well for sales of dress goods, trade has been interfered with by the snowstorms. The bulk of orders have been taken for such lines as devonite, home-spun, broadcloths, Venetians, cashmeres, netting cloth, etc.

The forthcoming issue of \$225,000 of new Dominion and Ontario navigation stock to pay for the new steamer Montreal and other vessels, will bring the capital up to \$23,130,000 out of a total authorized capital of \$25,000,000.

TURNED THEIR BACKS ON HER

THE SAD FATE OF A WAYWARD GIRL.

Parents Refused to Have Anything to do With Her—The Young Woman Sent up For Trial for Infanticide.

Toronto, Feb. 15.—The legislative committee of the manufacturers' association, at a meeting, yesterday, considered the bill introduced in the local house, by Mr. Freestone, to provide for the settlement of labor disputes by boards of conciliation and decided to oppose it.

Bertha Moon, the domestic, arrested on the charge of murdering her infant, was committed to stand trial next May. At the conclusion of the investigation, yesterday, permission was asked for the parents to be allowed to speak to the girl, but the parents refused point blank to have anything to do with their daughter.

The newly organized manufacturers' section of the board of trade, at a meeting, yesterday, decided to take a stand for a repeal of the present law regarding the exemption of machinery from taxation, which expires on December 31st.

The Montreal board of trade, in the meantime, has been asked by the manufacturers' section, asking for information as to the state of the law in Quebec.

Frederic Nichols, of this city, has presented to Ridley college, St. Catharines, a combined hall and hockey rink, which is to cost at least \$5,000.

The annual meeting of the Canadian society of authors was held here, yesterday, at which officers for 1902, were elected. Honorary president, Prof. Goldwin Smith, LL.D.; vice-presidents, Dr. Bryce, Winnipeg; Dr. Drummond, Montreal; Dr. Frechette, Montreal; Hon. G. W. Langley, Halifax; Duncan Campbell Scott, Ottawa; secretary, John A. Cooper, B.A.

The report of the inspector of lunatic asylums shows that, on September 30th last, there were 3,594 patients in the asylums of the province, as compared with 3,318 in 1900.

The Great Northwestern Telegraph company announces that, taking effect March 1st, its rate to India will be eighty-five cents per word, instead of \$1.23 per word.

FOR TRADE RECIPROCIITY.

John Charlton Wants Commissions To Express Themselves. Ottawa, Ont., Feb. 15.—Hon. John Charlton has given notice of the following resolution to be placed before the house of commons:

That this house is of the opinion that the Canadian port duties should be arranged upon the principle of reciprocity in trade conditions so far as may be consistent with Canadian interest. That a rebate not less than forty per cent. of the amount of duties imposed should be made upon dutiable imports from nations or countries admitting Canadian material products into their markets free of duty, and that the amount of Canadian duties should be sufficiently high to avoid injury upon Canadian interests in cases where a rebate of forty per cent. or more shall be made under the conditions aforesaid.

Queen's Debating Champions. By winning last night's debate with McGill in Montreal, Queen's has won the first inter-university debating championship of Canada. The league was formed last spring, the members being Varsity, McGill and Queen's. McGill obtained the bye and Queen's defeated Varsity at Kingston last December. Last night's debate, in which Messrs. J. B. Meares, B.A., and J. N. Bekkested, B.A., were the Queen's representatives, decided the issue.

The negative defeated their efforts chiefly by pointing out the advantages of a classical education, all of which the affirmative admitted. But as this was not the question at issue the negative failed to overthrow the affirmation of their opponents and the judges gave a unanimous decision in favor of Queen's. After the debate the Queen's representatives were royally entertained by the McGill students, who spared no effort to make their guests' visit a pleasant one.

What The Sea Gave Up. Vossische Zeitung, Berlin. A curious find has just been made at Sanriusban, Sweden. At low water a sailor discovered among the stones, on the beach of Massakabyas there, a sea-spoon of brass. After cleaning it he found engraved on the inside the picture of a man-of-war with the words "Maine" and "6,600 tons." The spoon would therefore appear to have belonged to the ill-fated Maine, sunk in Havana harbor in the spring of 1898, and it needed four years for the ocean currents to wash this tiny object ashore on the coast of southern Sweden.

Were Quietly Married. Thursday evening a middle-aged man and woman arrived in the city and registered at an Ontario street hotel, the man from Ottawa and the woman from Picton. They were assigned separate rooms and next day engaged a cab and driver from a local livery stable and drove across to Cape Vincent, where they were married in the parlor of a hotel there. Returning to Kingston they took the midnight train for the east, presumably to take up residence at Ottawa.

Is Coming to Kingston. Marden Kemp, specialist in piano treatment and tuning, is finishing a seven weeks' engagement in Picton, and will be in the city in a few days. 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WAS A SCENE IN CONGRESS

DENOUNCES "FLUNKYISM" TO FOREIGN COUNTRIES.

He Got a Dressing Down—Objecting to President's Daughter Attending Coronation and Received a Lesson in Manners.

Washington, Feb. 15.—The monotony of a private pension bill in the house yesterday was enlivened by a very sensational speech by Mr. Wheeler, Kentucky, in denunciation of what he denominated "flunkyeism" to foreign countries. He took the recent state-ment emanating from a continental cabinet regarding the attitude of Great Britain during the Spanish war as a text of a wholesale attack upon the trend of America's recent diplomacy.

He severely scored secretary Hay, and declared that if Lord Pauncefote had declared that the war of 1898, the sooner he was shipped across the seas the better. He also criticized the president for his reported intention to send his daughter to the coronation of King Edward, and protested against the official reception to prince Henry.
