be arranged upon the principle of reciprocity in trade conditiont so far as may be consistent with Canadian interest. That a rebate not less than forty per cent. of the amount of duties imposed should be made upon dutiable imports from nations countries admitting Canadian material products into their markets free of duty, and that the scale of Canadian duties should be sufficiently high to avoid injury upon Canadian interests in cases where a rebate of forty per cent. or more shall be made under the
