PUBLIC SENTIMENT NEEDED. Prohibitory Laws Cannot Be Enforced Without It. New York Evening Post.

Prohibitionists in the west, as well as in the east, are coming to perceive and admit that prohibitory laws cannot be enforced in any community where public serfine t does not sustain the policy, and that it is worse than uscless to apply laws of that sort in such a community. We quoted the other day the striking state ment made by Rev. Dr. Isaac K. Funk, the best known prohibitionist in this city, that "if I was king of prohibition city, even if I could do it

Equally striking are statements just made by one of the most prominent mea in Kansas, himself an earnest opponent of the liquor traffic, ex-governor Morrill, that there are many places in the state where public opinion does not sustain the prohibitory policy, and that "the law cannot be enforced where public opinion is ageinst it:" and of the Topeka Advocate, the prohibition organ, that the law, as now administered in deference to public opinion against it, "is more injurious to the morals of the state as a whole than the licensed saloon;" that it "is a pretext in most communities for public officials to take boodle;" that "in many counties blood money is exacted from the joint keeper by the county attorney down to the councilmen," and that "the
