KA EARTHQUAKE

4,000 Houses Destroyed-A Volcano in Active Eruption-Soldiers Sent to the Rescue-Red

Baku, Trans-Caucasia, Feb. 17. Details, which are slowly reaching Baku from Shamaka, about seventy miles from here, show that 2,000 people, mostly women and children perished as a result of the earthquake last week, and about 4,000 houses were destroyed. Thirty-four villages of the country surrounding Shamaka also suffered. To add to the terrors of the neighborhood a volcano, near the village of Marasy, to the east ward of Shamaka has broken out into active eruption. A great crevice has appeared, whence gigantic flames and streams of lava are being thrown out. The course of the river Geonchaika has been altered in consequence of its bed being damaged with earth, which had been dislodged by the earthquake. Rattalions of guards and detachments of sappers with tents have been dispatched to Shamaka to aid in the work of rescue. The Red Cross society is active in alleviating dis-
