THE GREAT ELECTRIC LIGHT SCHEME TO AVOID COLLISIONS BETWEEN TRAINS.

Lights Track For a Mile—A Novel Feature That is Likely to Be Introduced Very Soon.

Chicago, Feb. 12.—A practical demonstration of the utility of a new departure, which, it is claimed, will effectively solve the problem of the railway problem, was made last night on the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad near here.

The device consists of an exceedingly powerful flashlight, which not only perfectly illuminates the track with a distance of a mile, but also embraces the striking and novel feature of a beam of light of almost equal intensity penetrating over seven hundred feet above, which can be clearly seen ten miles distant.

A CHARMING WOMAN.

Keeps Open House For Interesting Americans.

One of the many houses in London at which Americans are sure of a cordial welcome is that of lady Stanley, the wife of Sir Henry, the explorer.

As Dorothy Tennant, the magnetism and brilliancy of lady Stanley was at once known to artistic and literary people, as well as those fashionable, she held her own, as naturally as would the talented daughter of a nobleman.

It is extraordinary that she can find time to do as much reading and yet not neglect her home and social duties. About the latter she is more punctilious. Happily for the women, housekeeping in England is not nearly so worrying as it is in America.

Perhaps this is because there is not the same necessity for them to stint themselves in the matter of servants. One at least of lady Stanley was at every turning. On Sunday afternoons, for instance, when one is driving up to the Stanley's house in Richmond terrace, and here he it understood that it is not in any way a pretentious man servant to help one out of the carriage or hackney and to pull the bell.

The door is then opened by another woman, who, standing in the doorway, indicates the location of the drawing-room. Here another comes forward, takes the card and announces to lady Stanley the name of the visitor.

Should the individual be a stranger with a letter of introduction, he would be shown into the small reception room while the letter is being read. Lady Stanley would then either receive the guest, or send him to the drawing-room, or else she would signify to the man servant on the spot that the visitor was to be shown into her presence.

Such a routine of man servants as this would naturally mean ruination to any in America but the most wealthy, while in England it is but the ordinary requirement for a simple day at home lasting through the whole season.

OLD RESIDENT DEAD. Thomas Kennedy Passes Away At An Advanced Age.

Philipville, Feb. 17.—Another old resident in the person of Thomas Kennedy, eighty-two years of age, has passed away. A large number of friends and neighbors followed his remains to the church, where Rev. Fr. Spratt delivered an interesting discourse to a large congregation. Deceased leaves an aged widow, three sons and nine daughters to mourn: William and Michael, on the homestead; Edward in Minnesota; Mrs. John Foster in Toronto; Mrs. Rose Buijger, Mrs. Dennis Murphy, Brewer's Mills; Mrs. Henry Fleming, Chaffey's Locks; Mrs. James Lappen, Lansdowne; Miss Aggie Kennedy, Smith's Falls; and Miss Anna at home. The family were all here at funeral, except Edward.

The deceased also leaves one brother and three sisters: Edward and Mary Kennedy and Mrs. Pennech of Spurr's Falls; and Mrs. Hart, New York. Six of his grand-sons were the pall-bearers.

Blood-Curdling Names. A London newspaper once pointed out in all seriousness some time back that the "natural savagery" of the Irish people in their struggle for home rule added something to blood-thirstiness of the names of their towns and country districts. Many of these places are named "Kill" something or another—"Kill" in Irish meaning "church" such as Killarney, Killalee, Kildare, Kilkenny, Kilslesh and Killybeggie.
