WHAT NEW YORK IS DOING

EVERYTHING IN GALA ATTIRE FOR PRINCE HENRY.

The People Distrust Croker's Election—The Sheriff Cuden's Statement—Calve's New Jewelry Fad.

New York, Feb. 19.—Everything is in gala attire and everybody wears an air of expectancy anticipatory to the great plans arranged for the entertainment of admiral prince Henry of Prussia. Some one has been kind enough to hint that with all the royal surroundings and associations the distinguished visitor will see some sights that will make his eyes open wide, because of their magnificence and splendor; remains that nothing could be more gorgeous than the entertainments prepared in honor of his royal highness.

Although beyond the calls customary upon such an occasion no reception has been given to rear admiral count Von Baudissin, owing to state etiquette, which prevents anything of the sort before prince Henry has been entertained. The officers and crew of the imperial yacht Hohenzollern have had a jolly good time, and they will leave America feeling a great friendship for the country than ever before.

Strange, too, that among the many sights which prince Henry will see will be the steamship Melbourne, which is being loaded with facilities intended in a way to do away with certain German interests in the Philippines. The Melbourne will carry to the east nineteen steam barges, or lighters, as well as a dry dock, a crane, a wrecking outfit, a complete machine shop, and much other cargo. The steamer and much of the cargo are the property of the Philippine transportation and construction company, which intends to revolutionize the methods of transportation in the harbor of Manila. The present systems are primitive and inadequate, and moreover the harbor facilities are controlled by German interests, which is a disadvantage that almost amounts to prohibition.

Ever since its arrival the Hohenzollern, the private yacht of the emperor of Germany, upon which prince Henry will entertain him, has been the Mecca of the curious, but to-day the crowds will be something like multitudinous, because the people are at leisure who clearly would be at their various places of business.

The members of the present boards of managers of the charitable and reformatory institutions are not entertaining the most cordial feeling toward governor Odell, because his determination to carry out his programme for the reorganization of the state board of charities. The bill which has been drafted for the purpose will be even more radical than the recommendations in his annual message, and that is saying a great deal. Instead of twelve members the bill will provide for only five, each of whom will serve for four years, provided that one of them shall not go out of office at the same time. All the present boards will be abolished, and the state board of charities will have supreme power and regulate the affairs and appoint the superintendents and stewards of the different institutions.

It seems strange that in spite of all his protestations of sincerity the public generally seems to have little faith in the announcement that Richard Croker has retired permanently from politics, especially as they concern the management of Tammany Hall. The cause of the rather general belief that he had planned to do his bidding—namely to Mr. Nixon and the new mayor—has been of greatest annoyance to Mr. Croker and the new mayor. It is reported that the ex-chieftain of Tammany has arrived at the determination for a number of years in England, to show that his retirement was genuine and permanent.
