THE BANK OF FRANCE

Celebrating The Centennial of Its Foundation.

Paris, Feb. 20.—The centennial of the foundation of the bank of France was celebrated to-day by the distribution of medals commemorating the estab-Notweman, March 29th. Sishment of the institution, which may be regarded as the most powerful creation of Napoleon Bonaparte, and as one of the institutions which has most contributed to the power and prosperity of France. The medals were designed by M. Roty, the great French engraver, and were struck offat the mint.

It is generally acknowledged that no French institution has more contributed to the development of industry and trade, and thereby, also, by the prosperity it has brought about and the civilization it has fostered, more aided in the development of science, aft and letters, than has the bank of France. It was Napoleon I. who, on the advice of the prudent Mollien, decided to establish the institution. At the end of the first year it was found that its productive operations amounted to 110,000,000 francs. Nothing could show more eloquently the extent of the route traversed since then than to compare this figure with that COPPORATION realized at the end of 1899-namely, 17,833,000,000 france, or nearly 170 times the original amount, to which might be added a general movement of non-productive values for the benefit of the treasury, amounting to sixteen milliards, making a total of thirty-four milliards.

ARTIST FREDERICK REMING-TON SCORES GRIEVANCE.

The Seining of Minnows-Mr. Remington Points Out Alleged Violation of Game Laws Whereby Work of Government Fish Hatcheries is Put to Naught.

Frederick Remington, the artist, who spends the summer among the Thousand islands, writes to the editor of Outing, concerning a grievance to do made memorable by the presentation with fishing in the St, Lawrence river. He says that hundreds of boatmen there take out every year licenses to operate eighty-foot seines. Often they tie these together. They bait a small bay with bread crumbs and by beating the water and otherwise herding the international committee for the the minnows they comb the water of everything living. The bait is sold by them to the itinerant fishermen stopping at the hotels. Mr. Remington continues :

that they take only chub and shiners. This is not so-they take maskinonge, bass, pickerel, pike and perch minnows also in great quantities, as have personally seen on many occa-

sions. They sell them for profit. "The state maintains fish hatcheries at great expense and to good' purpose. The question then is, why is it not bad law which allows a set of men to neutralize the work of the state, for which all pay, for their own benefit?

LEO'S SILVER JUBILEE.

It Will Be Fittingly Celebrated on March 3rd.

Rome, Feb. 20.-It was twenty-four vears ago to-day that pope Leo XIII was elected to the chair of St. Peter. The auniversary was not formally celebraten, but it is of especial note nevertheless as it marks the commencement of the observance of the twenty-fifth year of his sovereign pontificate. The jubilee is to be celebrated the 3rd of next month, the day following the ninety-second birthday of his holiness. The occasion will be of a precious triregno (triple crown). made of gold, encrusted with diamonds and rubies, the value of which will exceed \$200,000. The presentation will be made by cardinal Respighi, the pope's vicar-general and president of jubilee festivities. The pope will wear this crown on Easter Sunday during the solemn ceremony of thanksgiving to be celebrated in St. Peter's.
