Casper, Wyo., Feb. 19.-The notorious "Hole in the Wall," in former years a rendezvous for cattle rustlers, murderers and train and bank rob--Notes From All Over-Little bers, is now a thing of the past. The county commissioners have called for hids for blasting out a section of the Remembered By The Dear high wall of red sandstone, through which a small stream now flows, and along which there is a narrow trail leading through the wall of rock to the fertile valleys within, It is proposed to widen this trail, which was used by outlaws for many years, and pointed chief justice of the Transvaal which, guarded by a few men, made the "Hole" a veritable fortress, so that freight teams and ordinary veprietor and editor of the Sheffield hicles can pass in and out of the Hole-in-the-Wall country.
