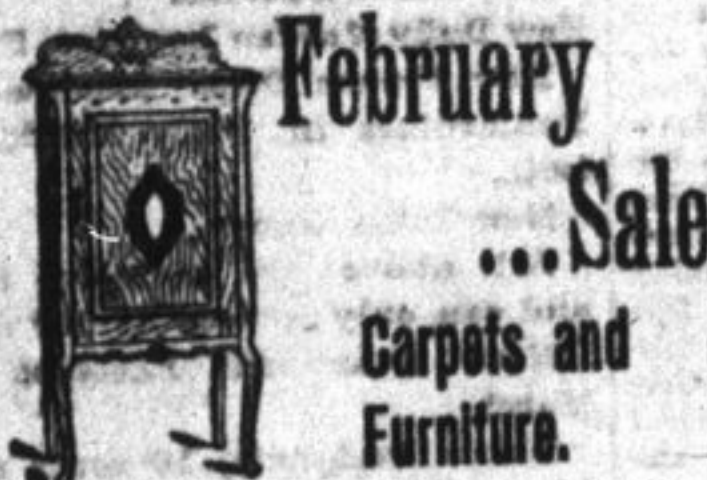

DEATH OF GEORGE WRIGHT.

PASSED AWAY THURSDAY NIGHT OF PNEUMONIA.

His Death is Sincerely Deplored - He Had Been a Councillor For Some Years - Active in the Township.

Ex-county councillor George Wright, appointed caretaker of the county court house at the recent session of the county council, died in the general hospital on Thursday night of pneumonia.

He was taken ill on the 11th inst., and two or three days ago was removed to the general hospital for treatment. Of a vigorous constitution, he fought the fall disease bravely, but was unable to shake it off and Thursday night yielded up his spirit.

THE LATE GEORGE WRIGHT. He was a painstaking, scientific farmer who aimed to secure the very best results from his farm. He entered the county council in 1893 and took a prominent part in all the measures brought before that body.

At the last session of the council he resigned his seat to accept the position of caretaker of the county court house, a position he was to take over on March 1st.

AGED GANANOQUEAN DEAD. On Wednesday, William S. McDonald, an aged resident of Gananoque, died in the register of baptisms, marriages and deaths solemnized by Rev. William Smart on January 21st, 1913.

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SPORT IN GENERAL.

At Last Kingston Drops From O.H.A. Finals.

England is beginning to appreciate Canadian hockey. The New York baseball league umpires will receive \$71 per day, rain or shine.

Toronto university hockey team plays Buffalo university to-morrow afternoon. Ottawa Aberdeens are winners of the western round of the intermediate Canadian hockey league series.

An excellent spectator, who punched a touch-line judge at a football game at Gloucester, Eng., got two months in jail for it.

For the first time in eleven years a Kingston team is conspicuous by its absence from the final games of the O.H.A. senior series.

McGill hockeyists state that they could have easily defeated Toronto Varsity on the Kingston rink which is larger than the one in Toronto.

Toronto Wellingtons play the first of the O.H.A. finals in Cornwall to-morrow night. The return match will be played in Toronto next Tuesday or Wednesday.

New York comes the report that players are deserting the National baseball league right and left on account of the precarious nature of affairs in that organization.

George Reilly, of East Sydney, Australia, swam the quarter-mile in the grand time of five minutes and forty-two seconds, completely shattering all previous records in any country.
