NERVOUS STRAIN. Sleeps Little, But Smokes Much-He is Losing Flesh Ow ing to His Obstinate Will-Evidently Determined That He

Will Starve to Death. Ottawa, Feb. 24 For four days Stanislaus Lacroix, the condemned murderer in Hull jail, has refused foods. He holds no conversation with his guards and turns his back when addressed. Take it away, I want nothing to eat." are the words he utters when his meals are offered to him. Yesterday he ate nothing. His last meal was dinner on Thursday. And since the he has refused food. The enforced fast and the terrible mental and nervous strain he is suffering under are developing signs of break in his health. Unless he partakes of food soon there will be collapse, followed, perhaps, by death. Last night he slept but little. His guards stated, on Saturday, that the doomed man dozed off occasionally into a fitful sleep, lasting at no time longer than thirty minutes; repeated ly he awoke with a start and paced ais cell. His chief solace is his pipe, which he smokes during the waking moments of the night, as well as during the day. Lacroix is losing flesh under the severe strain to which he is

WHERE MONEY GOES.

Will Never Divulge How Ransom Was Paid.

London, Feb. 24 -- Wiring from Constantinople the correpondent of the Daily Chronicle says he understands that, owing to the necessity of protecting the innocent persons who assisted them, the American delegates will never divulge where and how the ransom money for the release of Miss Stone was paid. The correspondent learns, however, that the ruse of filling the money bags with lead after the ransom had been paid, with a view of making it appear that the mission to pay the ranson had failed, was completely successful. It is practically certain that the ransom money goes to the Macedonian com-
